Happy 90th Birthday Mr. Knobby



Today we celebrated Mr. Knobby Mauro's ninetieth birthday. For the last number of years during Mr. Mauro's retirement he has been volunteering at Andrews Academy. He attends to the tables during the lunch hour and more importantly sits and talks with the students. He knows almost every student by name, if not the first name by at least their last name. Last name because he knows the vast majority of the students parents, grandparents, aunts or uncles because he either taught them, was their dean, or was their principal at some point in their life. I have the privilege of eating lunch with him most days, it is then that he often tells interesting stories of these students parents or grandparents were in his school that he worked at.

Mr. Mauro was principal of Andrews Academy (Emmanuel Missionary college Academy (EMCA)) from 1959 to 1969. He helped shape the traditions and culture of this school. Fun traditions such as Hodge Podge, Shydepoke, Winter Bible Camp to name a few. That's just the beginning of his nearly 60 years of devotion to Andrews Academy. Besides being a steadfast financial contributor to the school, he and his wife have personally helped numerous students living expenses by taking them into their home and provid-

ing for their needs.

At noon the students entered into the Commons singing happy birthday and continued singing as they gathered around him. He shared how he loves it here at AA and talking with you the students each day.

Introducing Mr. Dakota Hall - Student Teacher Next Semester


As part of our working partnership with AU, Andrews Academy teachers often collaborate with the Teaching and Learning Dept. to mentor young teachers-in



That at some point he decided to give his dog away, students gasped in disbelief. He then shared that he had decided to marry "Mrs. Martin", who was allergic to dogs. In order for the relationship to go to the next level you may need to let somethings go that may be hindering your relationship. Like Elijah he challenged each of us to look into our life to see if there is something that you may need to let go in order to live fully for Jesus.
