Kathy Berglund, PT, ATC, OCS, FAAOMPT

Kathy Berglund received her BScPT from the University of North Carolina (UNC) in 1978. She received her Masters degree in Athletic Training and Sports Medicine from the UNC in 1980. David Musnick, MD

Dr. Musnick graduated with a Masters in Public Health from the University of California, Berkeley in 1981. He graduated from the University of California, San Francisco School of Medicine in 1986.
