## CAREERS

### Our Programs

By plugging into our programs you can reach your dreams. Our programs offer diverse learning experiences from basic art, graphic design and technology courses to a variety of internship opportunities and a summer or school year spent overseas. Remember that you can connect many of these degree programs with a minor or second major that suits your career goals.

### Communication

The BA in Communication teaches you to be an expert communicator in diverse contexts. You learn communication skills and theory with special reference to improving human interaction. It includes all of the core communication courses, and others such as persuasion, effective presentation, intercultural communication, interpersonal communication, group dynamics and leadership. A minor or second major is required for this major.

### *International Communication Emphasis*

If you'd like to work in the international arena, then this is the program for you. It includes all core communication courses, as well as courses in anthropology and political science, and other multi-disciplinary courses that are chosen in consultation with an advisor. Requirements include participation in the Adventist Colleges Abroad program, the Student Missionary Program or a comparable overseas experience. A second major or minor is not required for this degree.

### *Communication Management Emphasis*

If managing and being responsible for development and progress interests you, a combination of communication, business and management will further your goals. This program includes core courses and several upper division courses such as media literacy and organizational communication. Electives are chosen in communication and management (from the School of Business Administration) in consultation with an advisor. An internship in a suitable area is required. A second major or minor is not required.

**Journalism** This program prepares students for careers as writers and editors for newspapers, magazines and publishing houses, and when taken with a minor in media studies opens up a whole variety of exciting media careers.

**Media Technology Emphasis** The media studies emphasis includes core communication courses, electives, English, media literacy, introduction to mass communication, photography and 9 additional credits that reflect a balance of art, design and technical courses. An internship in the area of media is required. A second major or minor is not required with this emphasis. Media Technology prepares students in the technology of media.

**Public Relations** The BA in Public Relations teaches students the study and practice of relationship building and image making. The student learns to develop an awareness of audience and to communicate effectively with a variety of audiences using all types of media. Recommended minors include marketing, visual art, behavioral sciences, English or graphic design. A second major or minor is required.

**International Public Relations** This emphasis includes all of the above courses, plus political science and anthropology courses. Requirements include participation in the Adventist Colleges Abroad program, the Student Missionary program or a comparable overseas experience. A second major or minor is not required for this degree.

**Electronic Journalism** The BFA in Electronic Journalism helps students to develop story ideas emphasizing good news from a variety of sources for electronic media. Judeo-Christian principles are used as the basis for accurate and objective reporting. The emphasis is on developing traits required and expected of a professional journalist and to make the transition from the classroom to the real world of journalism within the Church and beyond.

**Communication Arts** The Communication Arts program is a collaboration between the Department of Communication and the School of Education that prepares students for secondary school certification. There is an increasing awareness of the need to equip teachers with knowledge and skills to help students become discerning and competent communicators, and to become media literate.

Experience** You are being offered an ACE experience. Your time in the Department of Communication will focus on three areas: academic, spiritual and practical.

*The Academic  
Experience* Courses are current and focused toward career options and goals. Opportunities for growth and development of relevant skill sets in practical application are important. General Education courses will also contribute to this. Good teaching is critical in order to have good academic records. Portfolio development is a top priority of students and faculty. COMM480 Communication for Community should be taken before the senior year. Professional speakers will be invited to get students excited about communication and many career possibilities. Participation in volunteer work, workshops or leadership positions (clubs, organizations and groups) is encouraged. This enables students to gain experience which can be included as evidence in their portfolios.

*The Spiritual  
Experience* This component of the ACE program provides students with good ethics in their education experience. Christian values are combined with communication skills in order to provide graduates with the ability and perspective to work in any field of Communication. Graduates will communicate most effectively through a good work ethic and an authentic Christian lifestyle.

*The Practical  
Experience* The program provides students with opportunities to develop meaningful experiences and relationships through practical application of theory and knowledge. Opportunities for developing tangible products, such as press kits, portfolios, articles, publications, etc., are provided in courses and lessons learned in the classroom. Networking for good job placements and/or for internships is important. Alumni updates provide students with motivation for success.

## RESOURCES

### Media Ministry Program

An initiative started in 2001, was the development of co-curricular opportunities for students. The initiatives of Melchizedek Ponniah, students and volunteers, and the support of ILS (International Learning Systems) and WYGN-LP (Good News Television-channel 12) has resulted in the media ministry of the Department of Communication. The intent is to provide good news programming that will reach a non-Seventh-day Adventist audience. Programs in production are Scriptural Pursuit, Circle of Faith, Focus on Michiana, and Old Rugged Cross: Story of a Hymn. You can be part of a team that tapes Sabbath School University several times per year. This co-curricular opportunity has provided experience for many students who now work in broadcast media.

### Communication Club

The Communication Club is sponsored by the chair but run by the students. Student leaders are nominated and plan social, spiritual and academic events throughout the year. If you would like to be nominated for leadership, or if you would like to assist the student leaders, contact the current president or the department chairperson.

### Lambda Pi Eta

The honors club of the National Communication Association is designed to recognize students with high academic performance in their junior/senior years and also give them an opportunity to take leadership in the department. The club also encourages students to participate in the National Communication Association and plan events for the department. The major event for which this club is responsible is the Annual Communication Awards Dinner. A one-time membership fee is required and graduation cords are ordered during the final semester of study.
