A young woman walked out her back door, across her back yard, and into her neighbor's yard. As she crossed into the neighbor's back yard and approached the back door, she prayed for an opportunity to find a Bible study. She knocked on the door and a young mother answered. After a gentle greeting between the two women, she said, "I really love studying my Bible. If you are interested, I'd love to study the Bible with you." The young mother of two, whose husband was gone most of the time working and playing, heard those words. She smiled and agreed that she would like to study the Bible.

The Bible study began with them sitting down together in the young mother's home at her kitchen table. The young mother smoked and unknowingly put her cigarette in an ashtray right under the nose of the woman who was giving the Bible study. Never one time did the woman complain or say anything about the cigarette smoke. After completing the Bible study series, the woman invited the young mother to come to her church. So, one Sabbath that young mother got her two daughters cleaned up and dressed, and off to church they went.

When the husband of the young mother came home from work, he saw a difference in his wife. She had experienced Christ, and it changed her life. The husband wanted the peace and joy that he saw in his wife.

The two daughters loved Sabbath School. They sang the songs at home and were excited that they'd made new friends. One Sabbath morning the girls approached their dad and begged him to come to church with them. The young father, feeling guilty, said that he would go with them that day.

After parking their car, the young family walked together to the front door of the Seventh-day Adventist church. The husband had never been there before. In fact, he hadn't been in a church for 12 years. His throat was dry and his hands were wet. The front door opened, and a woman with her arms wide open and a smile even wider greeted the young family by hugging each one with a long, powerful hug. The young husband was shocked at the display of "welcome." He broke out into a sweat. He hadn't hugged anybody but his wife for years. Not knowing how to protest, he was reluctantly hugged by this stranger. Once seated in the church, the young husband and father was very uncomfortable during the church service, worried if he was going to get hugged on the way out. After the service ended, the deacons came to usher the people out of the church. The young mother and the two daughters went toward the foyer and the front door. The husband panicked and could not force himself to go back toward the foyer and be invaded by the hugger. He went in the opposite direction to a doorway at the front of the church that he had not entered before. As he opened the door and entered a hallway, a gray-haired woman was coming toward him. He held his breath and wondered if she, too, was a hugger. She extended her hand and said, "You're Teresa's husband, Dave, aren't you?" He nodded his head and said, "Yes, I am." Cradling his hand with a gentleness he had never felt, she said, "I've been praying for you. I hope you'll come back and visit us again." He felt touched by God.

She was so sweet and so kind that this moment became embedded in the young father's heart and mind. I know this because I was that young father. My heart was hardened by the world I lived and worked in, but God used this woman to crack that hardness. I went back to the church the next week so I wouldn't disappoint this special gray-haired woman. I've never stopped going to church from that time. Her name was Carol Hainault. She passed away a few years ago, but I will never forget her.

Personal Ministry: GETTING OUT OF YOUR COMFORT ZONE

Personal ministry is about connecting people with Christ so that they are able to think as He would have them think, desire what He says is best, and do what He calls them to do even if their circumstances never get fixed.” It involves exposing hurt, lost, and confused people to God’s glory, so that they give up their pursuit of their own glory and live for His.”

The Holy Spirit never ceases to amaze me. One Sabbath not too long ago, the pastor at the church I was attending told his members — in the most respectful yet direct way possible — that they needed to be more than just pew warmers. He wasn’t mean or flippant, didn’t have a tone. He just wanted them to step outside their comfort zone and look for ways to attract people, not necessarily to the Church, but to Christ. He wanted them to consider some type of personal ministry. Well, I have to admit, he reached me. For a while, I’d been thinking of things I could do to reach people outside the Church, to win souls. Indeed, the pastor’s sermon moved me. But, after recent conversations with four personal ministry leaders, I was convicted even more to do something.

What **Bessie Chambers** did in 2013 might seem out of the ordinary to some, but she didn’t really care what anybody thought, because she said she was working under the

auspices of the Holy Spirit. Chambers took more than \$5,000 from her savings, and, through the program PROJECT: Steps to Christ, had Christian literature mailed to everyone living in her zip code. She could have chosen a mailing route, but Chambers said she wanted to reach as many people as possible in Pass Christian, located in the Mississippi Gulf Coast region. Now, according to the 2010 census, Pass Christian had a population of a little more than 4,600, which meant Chambers essentially mailed literature to everyone in the city. She said part of her motivation for the mailings came from reading Ellen G. White’s *Testimonies for the Church*, volumes 1-9.

“In almost every volume, she encourages evangelism or witnessing, or some sort of mission work,” Chambers, who attends Maranatha Church in Gulfport, Mississippi, said in a recent interview. “And so, it really convicted me to do that.”

Chambers continues to do mass mailings, but now has the help of her church to pay for them. She has also started what she calls a community prayer ministry. Chambers said her objective is to “encourage people to pray” because of the perilous times in which we live.

“There are so many things going on in the world, so much corruption and school shootings. I told them if they would like, they could give me any concerns they have, and we can pray for them right now; or, if they didn’t mind, I could come back every two weeks.”

Chambers said her ministry has been well received, with numerous follow-up

visits to people in her community. She recalled one woman to whom she gave a *Steps to Christ* book.

“She took it on a flight,” Chambers said. “She came back, and I ended up having to give her an entire case of them. She wanted to give them to everybody.”

In Alabama, **Billy Pickett** is very aware of the impact *Steps to Christ* and other Christian literature can have in teaching people about God’s love and the difference He can make in their lives. That’s why he keeps literature in his truck and passes them out or places them anywhere he can.

“I’m all over the state of Alabama,” said Pickett, a member of Pell City Church. “When I stop to get fuel, I leave them at the gas pump.”

He said one place he and several church members enjoy passing out literature is at the Talladega Superspeedway, NASCAR’s biggest track, with a capacity seating of 78,000. He said twice a year, they work the campgrounds near the track, or set up near the track entrances. Despite some rejections, Pickett said many people receive the literature. He said the first step is putting it in their hands, and the Holy Spirit will do the rest.

“We’re called to spread the Gospel, spread the Word,” said Pickett. “His Word doesn’t come back void.”

Jasper Musgray of Tallahassee, Florida, knows firsthand what it’s like to tangibly receive God’s Word.

After serving a tour in Vietnam in 1966, Musgray said he ended up on the streets, and turned to drugs and alcohol as a way of escaping the horrors of war and a nation that couldn’t care less about his well-being. But, Harold Anderson, an elder at a local Seventh-day Adventist Church, did care, and he let Musgray know each time he saw him.

“When he saw me, he’d give me a hug, and say, ‘Jasper, we miss

you,” recalled Musgray, his voice cracking with emotion. “Hope to see you soon.’ He would never condemn me; I don’t care how drunk I was. It meant so much.”

Musgray said it was the nonjudgmental concern of Anderson, and his praying mother, that eventually drew him back to the Church, and to a relationship with Christ.

Today, at 74, Musgray said he and his wife, Willie Mae, have their own unique personal ministry that they use to win souls. They give vegetables from their garden to people in their community, and Musgray, who is a fisherman, maintains an open invitation on his 21-foot boat. Whether passing out vegetables or enjoying a fresh breeze out in the gulf, they both find a way to embrace those around

them, and to witness.

“One of the best things I can think of is just the pure fellowship,” said Musgray, who attends Maranatha Church in Tallahassee. “God blessed me to be able to bless others.”

Yaime Cordova of Atlanta found her ministry through a blessing God gave her. A native of Cuba, Cordova practiced law there before coming to the United States. Because she’d have to start over with a law degree here, she became a paralegal, a job she eventually left because her schedule conflicted with the Sabbath. However, God blessed her with another job. And last year, she became an elder at Atlanta First Hispanic Church.

“They challenged us to bring one person to Jesus in that year,

We are born again as laborers together with God. Therefore, in the spirit of Jesus, we are to “be about our Father’s business.” Our Lord and Savior made it clear to his mother and Joseph, that nothing would deter Him from His main mission, “To seek and to save those that are lost.”

As we begin this second quarter 2018 and look forward to 2019, the Southern Union Conference Year of Evangelism and Lay Evangelism, there are a number of materials available through the Adventist Book Center and *AdventSource*.

For those whose hearts are not as concerned for the lost as in days gone by, pray and ask God to stir up both their hearts and yours, and ignite a flame that will shine brightly for His glory in the midst of utter darkness. The Adventist Book Center has a number of Bible studies that can assist in helping others to understand God better and lead them to accept Jesus Christ as their Savior and Lord. One example is *Search for Certainty* by Mark Finley. The Adventist Television Ministries has some newly-released Bible study guides from *Amazing Facts*, *Breath of Life*, *It Is Written*, and *Voice of Prophecy*.

The Adventist Book Center also has a number of small booklets that can be acquired for less than one dollar each. These booklets cover a wide array of subjects on health, last day events, personal finance, etc. There are even better discounts that are given if larger quantities are purchased.

AdventSource also is a great reservoir of evangelism materials. They have some materials that can be very useful for group study after new converts come into salvation. A favorite item of many churches for preteens is *Bible Adventures for Young Readers*, which is full of life lessons. *AdventSource* also has a Bible study for teenagers, which is titled “Be Bold.” Seth Pierce, the author, identifies and covers principles that help young people recognize that in Christ Jesus they can be overcomers. Therefore, when Jesus comes again, they will hear the words, “Well done thou good and faithful servant.”

In the small book, *The Radical Prayer*, by Derek Morris, he challenges church members to pray another prayer that Christ taught His disciples to pray. In Luke 10:2 NJKV, it says, “The harvest truly is great, but the laborers are few; therefore, pray the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into His harvest.” May God help us to pray for more laborers in the harvest and in doing so may we join those who labor for the lost. —David Long, director of personal ministries at the Southern Union

and I accepted that challenge,” recalled Cordova.

She decided Bible study would be a good way to win a soul, and prayed to God to send her someone. Cordova said she prayed for months, but didn’t encounter anyone.

Then one day Fidel Hernandez, who had been attending her church, approached her and said someone told him she could probably help him. He needed advice that she could likely provide because of her experience as an attorney. What happened was nothing but the work of God.

In the midst of the legalese, Cordova said she and Hernandez somehow started

talking about Jesus, which eventually led to her giving him Bible study. She said there were 14 lessons, but by lesson seven, Hernandez surprised her.

“You know what ,Yaime? I want to get baptized,” she recalled him saying. “I know we haven’t finished the Bible study, but I want to get baptized.”

And, he did. Today, Hernandez is a deacon, and works diligently to try to bring people into the Church.

“He’s serving,” Cordova said. “He’s not just sitting on a pew. That’s a wonderful thing.”

Since Hernandez has been active witnessing and serving, he has been im-

pressed by the Lord to become a pastor. Antonio Quinones, first elder at Atlanta First Hispanic Church, gave him the contact information for Enrique De la Rosa, pastor at the South Jonesboro Hispanic Church in the Georgia-Cumberland Conference, who shared with him the steps to make his dreams come true.

New Study Underscores Adventist Health System's **FOCUS ON PHYSICIAN WELL-BEING**

Adventist Health System has been providing programs and resources to prevent and treat physician burnout since 2004.

While we rely on physicians to diagnose and treat the ailments and health issues of their patients, many physicians find themselves dealing with the effects of this demanding line of work in the form of burnout. For more than a decade, Adventist Health System (AHS) has been on the leading edge of efforts to prevent and address physician burnout. A recent national study published by Medscape underscores AHS's persistent focus on physician well-being.

The National Physician Burnout and Depression Report, part of Medscape's annual Physician Lifestyle Report, surveyed more than 15,000 physicians from 29 specialties. It found that 42 percent of physicians reported burnout, and 15 percent reported experiencing either clinical or informal depression.

Though these latest revelations may be surprising to some, Adventist Health System has been focused on physician well-being through the identification and treatment of burnout since the early 2000s. Under the leadership of Ted Hamilton, M.D., senior vice president of mission and ministry and chief mission integration officer, the organization approaches physician well-being in the same way it cares for patients. And,

true to its culture of whole-person health, Adventist Health System provides support services and resources for physicians that care for mind, body, and spirit.

"At the end of the day, health care is about people taking care of people. Our patients depend on our physicians to care for them, and we have put the onus on ourselves to care for our physicians so that they can live abundant, fulfilled lives, and also deliver the best care possible for patients," said Hamilton.

A catalyst for this effort is Adventist Health System's Center for Physician Well-Being (CPWB). Formed in 2004, the CPWB offers confidential counseling, as well as preventative and therapeutic services. This includes family counseling, seminars, retreats, and training. All of these emphasize health, balance, and self-

care practices to help prevent, identify, and mitigate burnout while promoting overall wellness.

In addition to resources provided through the CPWB, Adventist Health System has begun administering a yearly physician well-being survey, and also hosts its annual Physician Well-Being Conference. The conference is a multiday gathering of physicians from across the organization featuring speakers, research, sessions, and best-practice sharing.

Adventist Health System is also working to help encourage wellness among physicians on a broader scale. As a founding sponsor of the Coalition for Physician Well-Being, it has joined with others to promote the professional, personal, and spiritual fulfillment of physicians. Members are able to take part in monthly webinars, an annual national conference, and other offerings that cover a broad range of topics pertinent to understanding physician well-being. The Coalition also created the Medicus Integra© Award, which formally recognizes hospitals and health care institutions that demonstrate a significant, purposeful, and ongoing commitment to the well-being of physicians.

"Everything we have done to enhance the well-being of physicians reflects our desire to foster wholeness as an extension of our mission of Extending the Healing Ministry of Christ," added Hamilton. "Through the work we have done in our system, as well as what we are doing alongside other organizations with the Coalition, we believe lasting impacts can be made that ultimately enhance the overall health and wellness of individuals, families, and communities." 📍

Jesus' instruction was clear: "Go therefore and make disciples," Matthew 28:19.

In preparation for a major evangelism outreach taking place this month in Kansas City, Kansas, "Ed and Cathy" decided to take Jesus at His word.

Working with three conferences and many churches, extensive preparation work has been carried out in Kansas City, including the mailing out of thousands of Bible study interest cards. Hundreds of cards were received from people asking for Bible studies.

Although Ed and Cathy had held virtually every position in their local church, they had never given a Bible study. Eager to support the Reach KC initiative, they volunteered to follow up interest cards and study with people who had requested Bible studies.

They knocked at a door and were warmly welcomed. After becoming acquainted with the family, they left five copies of an It Is Written Bible study, and promised to be back a week later.

From that time on, Ed and Cathy met on Saturday evening with a family eager to learn more about the Bible and the God of the Bible. The studies were enthusiastic, participatory, and fun, and afterwards they would answer questions by text until as late as 10:30 in the evening.

"Seeing this family of five baptized and watching them grow into active church members has been a wonderful blessing," Cathy said. "And, I want people to know that our story can be their story. There are many more people just waiting for someone to open the Bible with them." And best

of all? "Best of all has been what this has done for us. Studying with people wanting to know the Lord has changed our lives."

We continue to see that when God's people offer themselves to be used in His work, God does great things. As we look toward the culmination of a city-wide evangelistic outreach in a major North American city, we are seeing God work powerfully. That's what God does. It's our privilege to be able to work alongside Him.

A key part of this outreach has been the It Is Written Bible Study Guides. Developed two years ago, they are now being used extensively in the United States and around the world as an effective soul-winning tool. One pastor commented on the It Is Written website, "I have used many Bible studies over the years, but these are by far the best I have ever used. They're clear, to the point, and Christ-centered, while kindly presenting the great truths of the Bible." Another

pastor told me, "We have more than 40 people taking the It Is Written studies right now. Many people are being baptized."

But, no Bible study is effective if it isn't used. It isn't uncommon to find boxes of unused resources stored in cupboards in churches or homes. Jesus never said that a shortage of resources would hold up His work, but a shortage of laborers.

I've seen again and again that when God's people make themselves available — as Ed and Cathy did — people are inevitably reached with the Gospel. Jesus promised us this would be so.

One day as He walked by the Sea of Galilee, Jesus made Simon and Andrew a promise that if they believed, it would radically alter the church. He said to them in Matthew 4:19, "Follow me, and I will make you fishers of men."

God will use anyone who believes that promise — that He would make you a winner of souls — to bring people for whom Jesus died out of the ocean of sin, and onto the shore of faith and hope.

Whether printed Bible studies, DVD presentations, or other methods of sharing Jesus, God wants to make you a "fisher of men." If you believe that the promise made to Simon and Andrew is a promise made also to you, you can expect God to use you to reach others, just as He used Ed and Cathy. And, when God has used you to impact another person for His kingdom, you'll be able to say as Ed and Cathy said, "The Lord has changed my life." ❶

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

and Family Baptized in Tennessee

Giorgio Chiesa is the son of an influential family in Italy. He was baptized in St. Paul's Cathedral (in the Vatican), in an ecumenical ceremony, by Pope Paulus VI, and a Muslim man. As a child, he remembers several times Karol Wojtyla (John Paul II) visiting his mother at her house.

When Giorgio was 12, he attended a Catholic school. On his first day in religion class he asked the priest, "How can you demonstrate that God exists?" He was immediately asked to leave class, with the teacher saying, "You do not question! You have to believe by faith!"

When the principal told Giorgio's father about his son's unbelief and questioning, he answered, "If my son cannot ask questions in your religion class, then he will not attend." Giorgio became agnostic. He grew up going to the best schools and universities in Europe, studying law and international business, and thinking that religion was a human invention and God was not real.

In 1999, while on a round-the-world trip between jobs in London, he met his future wife in Spain. Alejandra was born into an Adventist family in Colombia, but left the church in her late teens due to a family crisis. She then moved to Spain to live with her brother. After dating for some time, Giorgio and Alejandra got married and moved to London where she started attending the local Adventist church. While Giorgio took his wife to church, but he did not participate, as "Church was not for me." After eight years and two children living in England, they moved to Switzerland. There Alejandra met an Argentinean Adventist woman, and they became very good friends.

Four years later they moved to Buenos Aires, Argentina. While there, Giorgio's dearest sister passed away from an aggressive cancer. Giorgio and Alejandra were devastated. While in grief, Alejandra's Argentinean friend recommended they watch the video of an Adventist pastor at the Spanish-American Church in Collegedale, Tennessee. Religion

started to make sense to Giorgio.

Three years later the family relocated for work reasons to the Bahamas. They began to watch the Collegedale Spanish-American worship service online almost every Sabbath for several years. One day they called Joel Barrios, pastor of the Spanish-American Church, to invite him to come to the Bahamas. He stayed at their home, where he gave them four or five Bible studies that he has previously given to agnostic and atheists. It was a miraculous experience. When Barrios left the Bahamas, the family was not only happy, they were spiritually united.

In December they skyped with Barrios to continue studying the Bible. They then went to Colombia for the holidays, with plans to go skiing in Canada in February. While their ski equipment was being sent from Colombia to the Bahamas via courier, it was stolen. Giorgio told the family that they would buy new equipment and go to Canada anyway. While return-

ing from Colombia, Giorgio fell at the airport and broke his right arm, preventing them from going skiing. The family was saddened, as they loved skiing.

A few days later, Barrios called Giorgio to invite the family to an evangelistic meeting in Tennessee. By a miracle of God, the dates for the meeting coincided with those of the skiing trip, and the family agreed to travel to Tennessee.

The family, and Giorgio in particular, were impressed with the practical topics of Roger Hernandez, speaker for the evangelistic crusade and Southern Union ministerial director. He was amazed that his 12-year-old son, who is always complaining about attending church with his mom, was excited with his new church friends. During the week, Giorgio made the decision to get baptized, and on that Friday, Alejandra decided to be rebaptized.

Giorgio and Alejandra will be the first online members at the Spanish-American Church, requesting to be members in Tennessee.

It is pretty amazing how God works with planting seeds with friends and disappearing ski equipment. Giorgio and his family are excited about their newfound faith in God, and their new online church family. ☪

HOLDS SEEDS CONFERENCE

Every church that exists today is because of church planting, said Anthony WagenerSmith, associate director at the North American Division Evangelism Institute (NADEI). WagenerSmith was joined by pastors from around the Division at the SEEDS Conference in Birmingham, Alabama, February 9-10, 2018. Some of the visiting presenters included Sergio Quevedo from Boston, Massachusetts; Godfrey Miranda from Castle Rock, Colorado; and Richie Halversen from Clinton, Mississippi, among others. Each presenter shared their experience with church planting, and encouraged attendees to take a closer look at their own experience and how a church plant may have positively influenced their relationship with God. In WagenerSmith's presentation, he sought to clarify the misconception of what church planting is by showing what church planting has always been. As it turns out, Adventists have been planting churches since the very beginning of their history, though they haven't always called it that. In fact, one would be hard-pressed to find any record of "church-planting" if searched using those terms. The reason it would be difficult is that church planting is the natural process by which the Gospel is shared; it isn't just a term or ideal.

WagenerSmith referenced an Indiana newspaper article from 1886, where a local Adventist leader was questioned about how their church was growing so quickly. The response was that their church operated from the leadership of the local elders; their pastor started the church, but was then off to new territory beginning new groups that would eventually become churches as well. During the Adventist denomination's early years, planting wasn't just a phrase or buzz word; it was the normal operating procedure. WagenerSmith went on to explain that in the book of Acts, it was primarily the work of unknown people that brought about sig-

nificant growth of God's Church. In essence, in Bible time and recent Church history, the responsibility for church growth and sustainability wasn't resting only with the pastor or regional leaders, but with each Christian.

The reality is that in the present time, we have all of the training and resources needed to win souls for Jesus successfully. What is lacking are faith and effort. But, according to Halversen, it doesn't need to stay that way. In his Sabbath morning message, "Leaving the Drought," Halversen called for our lackadaisical relationship with Jesus to be changed for the better, and our service to Him renewed. Instead of fearing or assuming the worst about church planting, we should embrace the positive impact it is having all over the world. In most situations, church plants don't hurt the parent church; in fact, it helps. Within five years of planting, the mother church regains those they've

lost to the plant, and often gains more. In a later interview, Halversen explained that birthing a new church is by far a more natural process than attempting to resurrect a dead one. Perhaps our energy would be better spent trying to bring new life.

Gulf States presently has six to eight church plants, either planted or slated to begin within the year. Last year a church was planted in Tupelo, Mississippi, and this year the Conference will be planting in Hattiesburg and Oxford, Mississippi, and Port St. Joe, Florida, and hopes to plant five churches in the Birmingham, Alabama, area in the next two years. Students Study on Shackleford Island

They know the truth about God because He has made it obvious to them. For ever since the world was created, people have seen the earth and sky. Through everything God made, they can clearly see His invisible qualities — His eternal power and divine nature. So they have no excuse for not knowing God,” Romans 1:19-20 NLT.

Students in grades 5-8 at Myrtle Beach Adventist Christian School experienced this text firsthand. During the early morning hours of October 19, 2017, a group of staff and students loaded up vans and headed to Beaufort, N.C. Here they boarded a ferry to Shackleford Island for a four-day, three-night camping trip. Carrying everything they needed for the trip on their backs and in their hands, the 10 of them hiked 1 1/2 miles to set up camp on a site that had no electricity or running water. For the next four days they enjoyed activities such as hiking, fishing, dissecting, worshipping, shelling, and exploring the magnificent island.

Each morning began with worship on the shores of the Atlantic Ocean, and every evening closed with student-led worship around a blazing campfire. Throughout the day the students learned more about God through His second Book: nature. They worked on the Pathfinder shell honor; learned the external and internal parts of a fish through dissection; observed the night sky for constellations and meteoroids; and walked many miles exploring sand dunes, unique trees, winding shorelines, and marshy areas. The staff followed Ellen White’s advice to “let the child from his earliest years be placed where this wonderful lesson book shall be open before him. Let him behold the glorious scenes painted by the great Master Artist upon the shifting canvas of the heavens, let him become acquainted with the wonders of earth and sea, ... and, in all His works, learn of the Creator. In no other way can the foundation of a true education be so firmly and surely laid,” *Education*, pp. 100, 101.

Upon their return, the students were

asked, “What was the most important thing you learned from this trip?” Fifth-grader Randalyn responded, “We don’t need electronics to stay alive.” Several others replied, “Getting closer to God through His second Book, nature, was the most important thing I learned from this trip.” During this trip the foundation of a true education was “firmly and surely laid.”

All those involved — staff and students — returned home feeling a closeness to God and a greater appreciation for His creation. Evelyn, an eighth-grader, concluded that “the most important thing I learned is that God provides amazing adults that we rely on to learn and grow, who become like family to us.” It is because of willing volunteers and staff that the students at Myrtle Beach Adventist Christian School had this opportunity to clearly see God’s invisible qualities as displayed in nature. 📌



Forest Lake Academy's Biomechatronics Group Partners to 3D-print the Future

Forest Lake Academy (FLA) Biomechatronics Group in Apopka, Fla., has partnered with E-nable (*enablingthefuture.org*) to provide 3D printed prosthetic devices to children in central Florida who suffer from amniotic band syndrome. The syndrome is a congenital amputation disorder causing children to be born without an arm or hand below the elbow. According to the Amputee Coalition, one out of every 1,000 children in the U.S. is born with the disorder.

As an E-nable partner, FLA will 3D print, assemble, and distribute the assistive devices designed by E-nable to children in central Florida who suffer from the disorder. A professionally made prosthesis can cost between \$6,000 and \$10,000. Unfortunately, making the decision to purchase a prosthesis for a growing child is one that many are

not willing to make. The cost to produce the E-nable designed “robo-hand” is only \$35.

“What our students are doing is transformational, and it embodies the essence of our mission and vision,” states Frank Jones, FLA principal. His vision for STEM (science, technology, engineering, and mathematics) at FLA has paved the way for the formation of the biomechatronics group.

The biomechatronics group has begun designing an original mechanized prosthetic device utilizing Arduino and Myoware technologies. Currently, the prototype is going through its second iteration. FLA offers four courses in robotics that equip the student roboticists with the skill set needed to develop the devices: foundation of robotics, robot design, robot programming, and advanced robotics.

The biomechatronics group is one of several STEM interest groups that operates out of the FLA Robotics and Innovation Lab (RIL). Launched in August of 2014 as a robotics club, RIL is a STEM initiative that is designed to allow students to pursue their passions, and to develop within each participant the STEM competencies (resilience, STEM knowledge, and STEM identity) needed to successfully pursue a STEM career.

Other RIL groups include the Applied Robotics Group, the Brain Computer Interface Group, the Information Technologies Group, and the FLA Junior Robotics Group. The lab is composed of a maker space, a tech center, and an ideation space. ●

DiscipleTrek Could Change Everything



Chattanooga Hispanic Churches Hold “We All Have Problems Hope” Evangelistic Series

Intentionality is the key to accomplish any goal. This was demonstrated with the evangelistic series, We All Have Problems Hope. All of the Hispanic Adventist churches in the greater Chattanooga, Tenn., area worked together to share hope in Jesus this past February. More than 60 people were baptized, 100 more are having Bible studies, and 70 more have already made decisions for Jesus prior to the February meetings.

Directed by the Ministerial and Evangelism Ministries departments at the Southern Union, and the Latin-American Ministries of Georgia-Cumberland Conference, the events focused on Hispanic communities, and were carefully planned in 2017. Rick Blythe was born Donald Richard "Ricky" Blythe in 1951. When just a tiny baby, his little country grandmother prophesied over him that he would one day be a minister of the Gospel. He was raised by a cruelly abusive father and a kind and godly mother, with five younger siblings. When he was just 17, he left home to join the Navy and make a better life for himself. During his early

years as a Navy electronic technician, he met and married his lifelong love and best friend, Ginger Fitzpatrick. He didn't know at the time that she would be a powerful instrument to bring him to God.

While stationed in San Diego, Calif., and then in Guam, Micronesia, the Blythes were introduced to the Seventh-day Adventist message, joined the Church, and then decided to enter the ministry. They headed to Southern Missionary College (now Southern Adventist University) in Collegedale, Tenn., where he studied to be a pastor, and she worked three jobs and cared for a toddler and a new baby. They were privileged to help plant a church, which planted a seed in their hearts — a burning desire to see a Seventh-day Adventist church in their hometown of Piedmont, Ala.

ADU Bioethics Courses Teach Moral Discernment to Future Healthcare Workers

We can do it, but *should* we?" This is a question Andy Lampkin, Ph.D., associate professor of bioethics at Adventist University of Health Sciences (ADU), often considers.

Bioethics is concerned with ethical issues in healthcare, ranging from abortion to healthcare policy. Through his teaching of bioethics at ADU, students are exposed to a broad range of moral dilemmas that may be faced by a healthcare provider, and given the tools to work through and provide the best solution for the patient without compromising their values and beliefs.

Lampkin challenges students in his classes by introducing current issues in bioethics, and helping them understand the arguments from multiple perspectives. Utilizing the Socratic method, Lampkin keeps the discussion going by asking questions that force them to think about different positions, not just their own, and by pushing them to think past their initial reaction.

Lampkin stresses the importance of not simply telling students what to think, but rather *how* to think through a situation, as the circumstances will be different every time. In doing so, Lampkin helps the students develop a moral framework for issues they may encounter in their healthcare careers.

Lampkin is passionate about the idea of moral discernment and the ability to think ethically. As healthcare technology continues to develop, students will encounter new bioethical dilemmas. Through moral discernment, students will be able to ethically work through complex issues they didn't encounter in

the classroom. Students are then able to make decisions supporting the mission of extending the healing ministry of Christ.

In addition to teaching, Lampkin has participated in two Adventist Bioethics Conferences, with a third planned for May 2018. The conferences bring Adventist bioethicists and leaders from the five North American healthcare systems together with leaders of the Adventist Church to discuss current ethical topics

and concerns in health from an Adventist perspective.

"As a faith community, we should have a distinctive voice that will clarify and advance the Adventist position on various ethical issues," said Lampkin. To reach that goal, he's working with members from the conference to form an official Adventist Bioethics Consortium to provide guidance, so Adventist healthcare systems can respond consistently to common ethical issues. The Consortium would also provide continuing education, consultation, and training for Adventist bioethicists.

Through teaching his students moral discernment, Lampkin is giving back to the community. "What does this practice say about my faith commitment? How am I living out my deeply held religious values, my cherished commitments?" Lampkin asks. The future patients of his students can trust their provider will make the best decisions for them in a way that supports the values of everyone involved.

With a mission-focused institution like ADU, it's about teaching students what those moral and theological dilemmas will look like in the real world — in their future careers as healthcare providers. Developing skilled professionals who *live* the healing values of Christ means teaching them both compassion and critical thinking, the central lesson of Lampkin's course. 📌

Miami Union Celebrates 100 Years

The Bethany Church was established in the Overtown area of Miami, Fla., more than 100 years ago. Bethany members determined to provide the youth of the community with a quality alternative to public school education that would reflect the values of the church's community. In 1917, a school was established on 14th Street and N.W. 4th Avenue in Overtown, which they named Bethany Academy. The school began in a section of Bethany Church, with 40 students ranging from first through eighth grade.

Years later, the church relocated to NW 50th Street and 25th Avenue in Brownsville, and Bethany Academy, which had outgrown its church accommodations, moved to a building across the street from the church. In 1963, Bethany Academy became a constituent school, and the name was changed to Miami Union Academy (MUA). A few years later, ninth and tenth grades were added, and by 1980, the enrollment had climbed to 400 students. This increase in enrollment demanded a larger facility.

Through prayer, persistent effort, and a positive attitude, a location was identified and the move was made to a larger facility called the Mueller Building in Allapatah. The Allapatah location was shared with another school

and church. This place met the needs of the school for a few years, but then the physical condition of the building and the environment began to deteriorate. The school board felt that it was time to purchase a school home, a permanent place for Miami Union Academy.

In 1988 the move was made to a two-story building on Okeechobee Road in the city of Hialeah Garden, where, under the leadership of Rupert Ryan, Ph.D., the school opened all 12 grades. And finally, in 1997, a purchase was made which enabled MUA to offer education for students from age 2 through 12th grade.

During the past 20 years, MUA has continued to grow and changed to meet the varied needs of the community. Today, MUA continues to seek ways to add a much-needed gymnasium to the already excellent academic and spiritual program it provides.

Geographically, the school is located in the North Miami area, but students have come from as far north as West Palm Beach, and as far south as Homestead, covering an area of almost 110 miles. In addition, MUA reflects the general population of south Florida, accommodating students from the Haitian and Hispanic communities, as well as several islands of the Caribbean and West Indies.

This year, the MUA family celebrates 100 years that will culminate in a special weekend celebration that will take place June 8-10. The MUA family will celebrate the past accomplishments of the institution, as well as provide opportunities for partnership toward strengthening the future legacy of MUA.

Interactive Arboretum Experience Coming to Southern

Biology students at Southern have worked for the past year and a half to identify, locate, measure, and tag tree species on campus. The project, headed by the Biology Department and Landscape Services, received external funding through the University's Campaign for Excellence in Faith and Learning, allowing students to earn credit while working as they contribute to a bigger cause — the establishment of an arboretum on campus.

According to the Merriam-Webster Dictionary, an arboretum is “a place where trees, shrubs, and herbaceous plants are cultivated for scientific and educational purposes.” Southern's arboretum will primarily be located in the central part of campus in order to be easily accessible to both students and the community. In addition to tagging existing trees, the team is also planting new species.

“This project will help us develop a horticultural plan and increase the diversity of the trees we see on campus,” said Ben Thornton, Ph.D., biology professor and co-orchestrator of the project. “We want to create a place where community groups can come on campus and have an interactive experience with trees.”

Part of that interactive experience will include QR codes that will be placed on tree tags, leading users to a series of photos and diagnostic characteristics of the different tree species.

At this stage, having tagged each of the 1,100 trees in the designated area, students are using high-precision GPS technology to capture coordinates for each tree. By the end of the school year, the data will be translated into maps that allow users to explore the different types of trees, and see the exact location of the various species on campus. As of March, there have been 76 different species identified.

Eventually the arboretum will expand to include part of the University's exten-


