## The Doctoral Project



The standards for the Doctor of Ministry project are described by the Association of Theological Schools, our accrediting organization: "The program shall include the design and completion of a written doctoral-level project that addresses both the nature and the practice of ministry. The project should be of sufficient quality that it contributes to the practice of ministry as judged by professional standards and has the potential for application in other contexts of ministry.

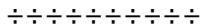
The ministry project should demonstrate the candidate's ability to identify a specific theological topic in ministry, organize an effective research model, use appropriate resources, and evaluate the results, and should reflect the candidate's depth of theological insight in relation to ministry."

The Andrews program integrates the project into the four years of program learning, includes a verbal presentation and evaluation, and calls for a chapter on theological reflection.

I have been encouraged by the quality of recent projects! I have seen new mentoring responses for specific institutions, mobilized congregations for community intervention, new spiritual direction initiatives, new models for church planting, improved leadership and administration models, and new organizational structures to advance mission. These and many, many others are making a difference! These projects "change the people who change the world!"

## Preaching



Dr. Hyveth Williams coordinates this concentration, designed to equip participants with resources for transformational prophetic preaching. Preaching the Word has the power to transform hearers. Participants will be challenged, inspired, and motivated to be great prophetic preachers of the 21<sup>st</sup> century. As graduates use the resources garnered from this concentration, congregational revival will be the anticipated reward. The first intensives will meet at the Andrews campus in June 2011. Application deadline is **April 1, 2011**.

Persons who are not United States citizens or permanent residents usually need student visas to attend intensives, and should apply at least 6-8 weeks earlier than the published application deadlines.
