

## **Colleagues and Friends in Christ's Ministry**

I met with my context support group (CSG), as a class requirement for the purpose of sharing my Ministry Development Plan (MDP). Being socially an introvert I initially was concerned about my vulnerability to criticism. As a pastor of a local church, I perhaps had the same stereotypes of congregations that I thought my members had of Pastors.

My desire to be honest and open in my MDP, would include my current personal context. There were good things to write about and personal areas which I was not so sure about sharing. My CSG consisted of my closest church members and we were still new to each other.

We met on November 21, 2019. My discomfort changed to gratefulness during these two hours of consulting with each other. I felt peace and a sense of trust for my CSG as I shared my thoughts openly while they listened with a genuine interest and spiritual maturity. Throughout the experience, I started to genuinely connect with my CSG. Through our conversations we realized that there really was no difference in our needs for support and validation. I was able to show them that their pastor was vulnerable and a human being just like them. After this first part they not only saw me as their pastor, they also embraced me as a friend and a new level of mutual trust was developed.

After talking about my personal context, we talked about the vision of my ministry. This time the CSG started opening up to me.

# "This was not my ministry any more, it was our ministry."

They not only gave me their feedback, but started sharing their own ideas and thoughts about our church and our ministry. This would turn into a positive effect for our church to grow spiritually. As a result we recently approved a church board appointed "Vision Committee" to cast a vision and mission statement for our church. Many of the CSG are on this Committee. When the Vision Committee had their first meeting last month, they worked to integrate the very ideas that we shared in our CSG meeting.

The CSG is now taking ownership and leadership of the church. As much as they embraced me as their friend, I can embrace them as coworkers in ministry. The meeting with my CSG was a mutual blessing to me and the CSG. We are now colleagues and friends in Christ's ministry.



The **MDP** describes your current situation, your vision for your life and ministry five years in the future, and steps to achieve that vision pursued during the years of your DMin program.



## **Context Support Group (CSG)**

Create a group of 5-9 people who will meet for one session to give you feedback on your Ministry Development Plan (MDP). The Context Support Group is just what the terms say:

- · **Context**—People who know you in your ministry and personal contexts (such as coworkers, key leaders, a boss, someone you serve). You select and invite them.
- **Support**—You want people who will be supportive of you and give honest feedback on your plan (MDP), and yet push you toward that vision and hold you accountable as they cheer you on.
- · **Group**—Meet as a group to provide you input in the group setting after you have completed your MDP for the first year and sent each person in the CSG a copy of your MDP. It's up to you to schedule and plan this one-time meeting that should last about an hour.

Because you are sharing your professional and personal plans, create a warm and supportive environment in which people can give honest feedback and helpful direction. After your one-time meeting with your Context Support Group (CSG), revise your MDP again because of what they shared with you. While you meet only one time, feel free to ask for additional individual input and support as you choose.
