

WHAT IS IT?

The chaplaincy concentration seeks to develop the person, knowledge, and practice of its participants, enhancing personal spirituality, enriching the personal life, and improving professional relationships through an expanding awareness of what God has called them to be. Two specialized tracks are offered on a concurrent schedule. One is especially for those working in health care, while the other track is an appropriate choice for professionals in military, correctional, community, educational, or other chaplaincy specialty.

WHEN DOES IT BEGIN?

The teaching intensives for the first module will be March 31-April 15, 2014.

WHERE WILL THE INTENSIVES BE HELD?

The first, third, and fourth years' intensives will be in Orlando, Florida. The second year's intensive will be held on the campus of Andrews University. See the schedule on the sidebar for further details.

HOW IS THE PROGRAM ORGANIZED?

Each of the year-long study modules includes a teaching intensive. During the program you will also participate in regional work groups, develop a context support group, establish a mentoring relationship, read and reflect on the best literature in the field, as well as develop and evaluate a professional project within the context of your own congregation or leadership responsibilities.

OUTCOMES - WHAT WILL THE PROGRAM ENABLE YOU TO DO?

The DMin in Chaplaincy develops competencies in these areas:

 Academic Advancement – Acquire knowledge of current issues and research related to the field of spirituality and wellness; learn basic research skills; engage the discipline through sociological and psychological perspectives, and an understanding of organizational culture and systems thinking.

- Spiritual and Theological Development –
 Reflect theologically; gain enhanced personal
 spirituality, enriching the personal life; become
 aware of strengths and limitations and realize
 the impact self-awareness and self-understanding may have on ministry.
- Praxis Exercise wise and competent application of spiritual care theology and theory to practical and innovative solutions for ministry challenges.
- Professional Formation Gain knowledge of the professional field including spiritual leadership, networking, interdisciplinary consultation, interdepartmental relations, and ethical conduct.
