Ethnic Makeup of Worldwide SDA Church Membership – June 2008

The following table provides an overview of the ethnic makeup of the worldwide SDA church in 2008. The data suggests that those of African heritage make up nearly 35% of the church; Asians make up 18% of the church; Hispanics make up nearly 35% of the church; and Anglos make up 12%. *Note: the data is not scientifically accurate (i.e. it does not take into account the actual diversity within divisions) but broadly categorizes each church division as a single dominant ethnic group.


