# **Teacher Legacy Award**

CLEMEN SHEPPARD '92-'05 & BRADLEY SHEPPARD '87-'99

lemen and Bradley Sheppard are retired professional educators after 37 and 41 years of service, respectively. Most recently, Clemen was Chair of the World Languages Department and Spanish instructor at St. Joseph (MI) High School. She retired from this position at the end of the 2018 school year. Bradley recently served as the Assistant Superintendent of Instruction with Elkhart (IN) Community Schools and retired at the end of June 2023.

Clemen was born in Havana, Cuba, and emigrated to New York City at the age of 12. Having attended Andrews University, one year of which included a study abroad experience at Adventist University of France (Campus Adventiste du Salève), she graduated in 1981 with a BA in Spanish and French. She earned a Master of Arts degree in Educational Administration and Supervision from Andrews University in 1996. Bradley was born in Battle Creek, MI, attended Battle Creek Academy (the very first Adventist school), and graduated in 1982 from Andrews University, with a BA in History and Religion. He also received a Master of Arts in Educational Administration and Supervision in 1987, and a Ph.D. in Leadership in 2011, both from Andrews.

Before her work with St. Joseph Public Schools (2005-2018), Clemen served for thirteen years (1992-93 through 2004-05) at Andrews Academy in Berrien Springs, MI, as a Supervising Instructor in Spanish and Director of the Media Center. From 1987-1992, she taught Spanish 1 through 4 at Brandywine Community Schools in Niles, MI. From 1982-1987, Clemen was an instructor of Spanish and French at Broadview Academy in LaFox, IL. She began her teaching career in the 1981-82 school year as a 5th and 6th grade teacher at the Lakeshore Seventh-day Adventist School in Chicago, IL.

Prior to his district administrative roles with Elkhart Community Schools (2005-2023), Bradley served as the Director of Student Teaching and Assistant Professor of Teacher Education at Andrews University (1999-2005), a Supervising Instructor in the Social Studies and Director of Student Recruitment and Retention at Andrews Academy (1987-1999), and an Instructor in the Social Studies at Broadview Academy (1982-1987).

Having served at the elementary, high school, and higher education levels, both in Adventist and public schools, the Sheppards consider the years they spent at Andrews Academy to be among the best, and they feel fully blessed for being given the honor of teaching a special cadre of outstanding students at AA. This is something for which they will always be grateful!

As educators, the Sheppards developed a deep love of and appreciation for educational travel and study with students. First, during their professional years they, either together or separately, led numerous educational study tours to Mexico, Spain, Canada, New England, Washington, D.C., and the middle Atlantic states. Additionally, it was during these years that Clemen served on the Adventist Colleges Abroad (ACA) Board, and Andrews Academy became one of the first Adventist high schools to participate in the ACA summer program. The Sheppards sincerely believe that this "school without walls" approach to learning affords students a unique opportunity to learn about language, history, people, and cultures in a way they could not experience by just reading and studying about these topics in a classroom.

During their years in education, the Sheppards received numerous awards and recognitions for their work in the field. These include the Berrien County Golden Acorn Award for Excellence in Teaching (Clemen), the Zapara Excellence in Teaching Award, the Zapara Study Fellowship Award, the Andrews University Supervising Teacher Award (Bradley), and the Commissioned Ministry of Teaching Credential from the Seventh-day Adventist Church (both).

The Sheppards have received specialized training in various contemporary instructional and curriculum models of excellence, which they not only applied into their own practice, but into the professional development of other veteran and aspiring educators. They have jointly and/or independently served as adjunct professors, teaching courses at Andrews University, Columbia Union College (now Washington Adventist University), Bethel University, and Indiana University South Bend. Bradley has served on the dissertation committees of Ph.D. students at Andrews University and Indiana State University. The Sheppards have given numerous presentations in various educational settings on a wide variety of educational topics and issues. In all of their pursuits, both in Adventist and public school settings, the main goal for the Sheppards has always been the true aim of education, in the words of Ellen White, to "restore people into the image of their maker," and to prepare students "for the joy of service in this world and for the higher

joy of wider service in the world to come." They believe this was their true calling to which they dedicated their careers.

The Sheppards met as freshmen at Andrews University, dated throughout their undergraduate years, completed their Bachelor degrees and teaching certification together, got married in 1982, and just recently celebrated their 41st wedding anniversary. And just like Jacob and Rachel of the Bible, they like to say, these years have "seemed but a day for the love we share." They have one child, Amy, a graduate of Andrews Academy (2003) who served for two years as Yearbook Editor and as Senior Class President. Today, she is a practicing attorney. It is no surprise that the Sheppards immensely enjoy traveling to different parts of the world whenever possible and spending quality time with their daughter, son-in-law, and two young grandchildren.

Leroy made one of the best decisions of his life when he married Judy Sharpe in 1960. They have lived at their home on Timberland Dr in Berrien Springs for 50 of those years! During the bulk of his career, Leroy owned and operated Patterson Printing Company which manufactures educational books for school publishers. He has been enjoying his retirement years since 2010 as son Gregg now carries on the family business.

oug Taylor graduated from Andrews Academy in 1998, making amazing memories and even more amazing friendships that have endured the test of time (though are sometimes tested on the pickleball court). While enrolled at the Academy, Doug discovered the power of creativity and his passion to apply it whenever possible. Even seemingly simple projects, like crafting a Piñata for Spanish class—a project that was only meant to be a balloon covered in paper mache—evolved into an elaborate, three-foot-tall rendition of the "Grinch who Stole Christmas." He learned that creativity was nearly as essential as oxygen and that it made school not just bearable but enjoyable. As a bonus, he discovered that sometimes, turning a math problem into a whimsical illustration can yield surprisingly entertaining results.



After graduation, Doug realized that there are few jobs for professional Piñata makers but discovered the wonderful world of graphic design during his undergrad experience at Andrews University, and he has never looked back. He has worked with clients all over the world both large and small, including Kellogg Corporation, Yum! Brands, Jeep, Yamaha, and First Source Bank, to name just a few. In 2010, Doug found his true calling when he became a professor of Graphic Design at Andrews University; the very school where he originally honed his own design skills. Today, Doug shares his knowledge, experience, and deep faith with the next generation of artists and designers. He loves nothing more than helping his students reach their full potential, both professionally and spiritually, and guiding them on their own creative journeys.

Doug is also deeply committed to his local church, where he channels his passion for creativity into sharing the timeless teachings of the Bible through the art of storytelling. Whether it's teaching the young adult Sabbath School, telling an animated children's story, or reenacting Bible tales during Vacation Bible School, Doug finds immense fulfillment in exploring the profound truths of God's word and sharing it with others.

# Alumnus of the Year Criteria

An alumnus (graduate or attendee of ECA/AUA/AA) is selected each year to be honored at alumni weekend as Alumnus of the Year. A candidate for this award may be nominated by any Andrews Academy alumnus, current faculty member, or former faculty member, but all nominees should be in an honor class. Often a member of the fifty-year class is recognized.

### **Award Criteria**

The nominee's life must demonstrate the philosophy and vision of the school. The philosophy is best described by the quote on the theme wall: "To restore in man the image of the Maker is the object of education." The vision statement of the school is, "As a Seventh-day Adventist secondary school, Andrews Academy seeks to inspire its students to think deeply, live fully, serve unselfishly, and honor God completely"—which has been expanded upon for the purpose of this award. To be considered for this award, a candidate must exemplify the criteria below:

- To Think Deeply: The individual has achieved success in his or her profession.
- To Live Fully: The individual has lived a life filled with meaning and balance.
- To Serve Unselfishly: The individual has modeled outstanding service to society and/or the church.
- To Honor God Completely: The individual exemplifies Jesus in his or her daily life.

The Alumni Advisory Council recognizes that evidence of successful personal application of the philosophy in one's relationship to God is impossible to truly ascertain. However, evidences of outstanding contributions to one's environment, family, church, community, or workplace can be more readily assessed and will be considered. In keeping with Christ's story of the widow and the mite, it will be remembered that at times one who lives a quiet and steadfast life may be the most worthy recipient of this award.

### **Nomination Process**

All nominations must be submitted in writing to the Andrews Academy Alumni Coordinator. Nominations will be received for the following year starting the Monday after alumni and will close on June 1. Anyone may nominate a classmate from an honored class by answering the questions below and providing the information requested. The nominees may be contacted by the Alumni Coordinator for further information and clarification. Selection of the award recipients will be determined by the Alumni Advisory Council by mid-summer. This council consists of the alumni coordinator, principal, a faculty member, and representatives of the honored classes.

# **Project Chapel - Phase 2**

We also put in a new audio system and LED lighting in the chapel. A new feature wall that hides the "backstage" was also included for programming feature purposes. The backstage door opens up to C Wing. Two large TV screens were added on each side for projection purposes.
