Trained as an urban planner, Lynn Todman, PhD has a strong and demonstrated commitment to the needs of low-income urban communities. The focus of her work includes health equity, social determinants of health (including mental health), health impact assessment, urban poverty, community development, and the impact of structural racism on community health.

Lynn is the Executive Director for Population Health at Spectrum Health Lakeland (Lakeland) in St. Joseph, Michigan. In her role, she helps set the strategic direction of the health system efforts to improve population health and reduce health inequities.

She is also the catalyst behind Community Grand Rounds, a speaker series designed to educate healthcare providers and community members about the connection between racism and health, and to use that education to narrow health inequities in Berrien County, MI. Lynn has also stimulated a series of community gatherings, Brave Talks, that provide community members with understanding, language and tools to bring about community change.

Lynn is also a Robert Wood Johnson Culture of Health Leader. A national leadership development program supported by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, the Culture of Health Leader Program fosters collaboration between people from all fields and professions that have an influence on health.

As an author, keynoter, panelist, and a moderator at conferences throughout the U.S., Canada, and Europe, Lynn has addressed a variety of topics, including social exclusion, childhood trauma, the social determinants of mental health, mental health impact assessment, health equity, and structural racism.

Prior to her role at Lakeland, Lynn was Vice President for Leadership in Social Justice and Executive Director of the Institute on Social Exclusion at the Adler School of Professional Psychology in Chicago. She's also held positions at the University of Milan and the Politicnico di Milano (both in Italy), Western Michigan University, University of Notre Dame and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

Lynn earned a B.A. from Wellesley College, and a Master's in City Planning (M.C.P) and a Ph.D. in Urban and Regional Planning from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. Since 2018, Lynn has been a commissioner of the city of St. Joseph and is the commission's representative on the Downtown Development Authority.
