One of the great academic mentors in my life passed away this past March, two months shy of his 86th birthday. Professor Ray (“Doc”) Hefferlin, a physicist at Southern Adventist University, mentored many undergraduate research students who went on to graduate and professional school. He was highly active in research, publication, and presentation until Friday March 6, and he passed away the next day, on Sabbath March 7. His research was known internationally, especially in Russia. Last summer, Doc’s final research student, Joshua Barrow, finished up the paper they were coauthoring and is now working on a PhD in Physics at the University of Tennessee, Knoxville.

Doc’s artist daughter Melissa painted a portrait of him holding a model of his periodic table of diatomic molecules. A framed print of that pastel painting now hangs in my office at Andrews University. When I look at Doc each day, I remember what a difference mentoring makes in the lives of young people.

To give our students the best education and career preparation possible, we faculty must be well-known and well-networked in our research communities, and we must include our students in our research activities. It is important for us to take our students to conferences to present their research. We work hard each year to find funds to continue this work. 
