THE GIFT AND GIFTS OF THE HOLY SPIRIT

The gift of the Spirit is Christ. Unmeasurable, undivided, and overflowing with grace. All other spiritual gifts are contingent on that gift alone.

The gospel story is about gifts. God created and owns everything. But He loved the world so much that He put everything at risk and gave His one and only Son (John 3:16), the unique Person who was one with God from eternity. His giving is an expression of agape love. The abundantly rich God gave Himself in Christ. Upon receiving this gift, we are sent to share it with the world.

In the New Testament, the Holy Spirit is described as the benefactor of the divine household (Rom 8:26-27) who comes to our aid and brings us the gifts belonging to God's children. The Holy Spirit brings Christ to us and us to Christ (John 14:26; 16:13-15). The epistle to the Ephesians especially underlines the riches we have received by being adopted into God's family, the "riches of his grace" (1:7), "the riches of the glory of his inheritance in the saints" (1:18), "the riches of his glory" (3,16). God is "rich in mercy" and has "given" Paul the "stewardship" of sharing "God's grace" (3:2), "to preach to the Gentiles the unfathomable riches of Christ" (3:8).

So, when Paul speaks about the "the measure of the gift" in Eph 4:7, he refers to the one gift which is without measure, namely Christ Himself. And a person who has received Christ freely is then given to the Church. Therefore, the spiritual gifts to the Church mentioned in Eph 4:11-12 are persons, such as apostles, prophets, evangelists, pastors, teachers – and many more to which also you may belong. You too, as a person, may be a gift.

Spiritual gifts are, therefore, not identical with natural skills, and you cannot find them simply by common psychological tests or surveys. People may have natural talents, but as long as they only use the capacity received through inheritance or upbringing for themselves, they are not spiritual. They only become spiritual gifts the moment they are shared--that is, given to the Church--unselfishly, like Christ offered Himself in service for humankind.

All spiritual gifts depend on that one unique and unmeasurable gift of the Spirit, Jesus Christ. When He is received in your life, the Spirit is able to transform you into a gift to the Church and the world. Your natural talents may become spiritual gifts by being shared, and as the Spirit wills, you may receive further gifts for service to God and the world for which He gave himself.

The Religion Department is here to help you to receive God in Christ, to submit your life for service, and to develop your natural talents and dedicate them as spiritual gifts to the body of Christ, His Church.

WHAT IS NEW IN THE RELIGION DEPARTMENT?

Two years ago we revised the BA in Theology with more emphasis on research, streamlining of classes, and extended practical theology. The time has come to implement new aspects of the BA in Religion.

BA in Religion & Society

A new concentration has been added to our BA in Religion package. The traditional BA in Religion has been retained and now labeled "Biblical and Theological Studies".

• This concentration still caters to untraditional students who aim to enter the Theological Seminary. If you are a transfer student in that category, please go to Student Success and make sure your concentration is registered.

The BA in Religion & Society is unique because it contains flexibility to help students combine it with another major. It is not intended to stand alone. Students take core Religion classes and then are able to deliberately pursue religious aspects in the classes of their second major also. For the program content, see the more detailed description. Speak with your advisor in your second major about the possibilities, and together with your Religion advisor you will be able to build an interesting and beneficial program.

Three new certificates

Three new certificates with 17-18 credits are being implemented this year. While the Certificate in Spanish Ministry is only taught online, the other two certificates are available to take on campus; a Certificate in Christian Discipleship and a Certificate in Missions and Global Awareness. See more detailed description of the content on page 16.

Many students on campus may benefit from taking one of these certificates. Earning a certificate helps in choosing classes for a purpose, and in specific classes to focus on aspects particularly related to the certificate content.

In the spring semester of 2016 a new class related to the Certificate in Missions and Global Awareness will be taught for the first time: RELG 110 Global Adventism and Cross-Cultural Service.

Pastor Chris Holland is the Speaker/Director for It Is Written Canada. Prior to this, he served at the North American Division of Seventh-day Adventists as the

Secretary/Treasurer of ASI. In his years of ministry he has worked for the Illinois and Chesapeake conferences, pastoring a total of six churches.

In 2009/2010, Pastor Holland was the Chicagoland Evangelism Coordinator for the Illinois Conference, coordinating over 34 evangelistic meetings which resulted in over 500 people being baptized. Chris has been involved in media ministry since his early undergraduate years in college, where he was involved with both television and radio programs. He graduated from the Religion Department in 2001. It is his sincere desire to know Jesus more and to utilize the many media

outlets to preach God's word with power. Since their marriage in 1996, Chris and his wife Debbie have served the Lord together and strive to do all that they can to fulfill His commission to take the Gospel to the "ends of the earth".

NOT A RELIGION OR THEOLOGY MAJOR? RELIGION IS FOR YOU, TOO!

All undergraduate students take 12 Religion credits. 3 of these come from the class **RELT 100 God & Human Life**, an ACE (Andrews Core Experience) requirement. The remaining 9 credits can be taken from almost any Religion class. A few upper level classes require prerequisites. Some disciplines require that students take an ethics class, so check with your advisor. It may be **RELT 350 Religion & Ethics**, but other interdisciplinary ethics classes are also taught.

Some Religion classes are taught on a higher level and not easy to access, but a large number of classes are very beneficial for Andrews Core Experience students, such as:

- RELG 110 Global Adventism and Cross Cultural Service new class taught in spring 2016
- RELB 225 Jesus in His Time & Ours taught every semester
- RELT 225 Doctrines of the Adventist Faith

 taught every semester
- **RELG 225 Introduction to Missions** to be taken on a short term mission tour a great opportunity
- **RELB 230 Apocalyptic & Biblical Prophecies** taught in Fall 2015 concurrently with RELB406 Daniel & Revelation emphasis this fall on Daniel includes conducting a public seminar in Village Church
- **RELP 240 Personal Witnessing** taught evenings in Fall 2015 in the Village Church
- RELT 250 Personal Spirituality & Faith several sections each semester
- **RELG 350 World Religions** taught in Fall 2015
- RELH 400 SDA Heritage & Gift of Prophecy though upper level, many students have enjoyed this class

OR WHY NOT GO ON A TOUR?

Every second summer the Religion Department arranges a major tour to the Bible lands. The next two tours will take place in 2016 and 2018, respectively. Every second summer we plan an evangelistic trip where Andrews Core Experience students are invited to join for mission and service. Further, Dr. Russell arranges a short-term mission trip to Lebanon every year. Two Religion classes can be taken on any of these tours.

LOOK FOR THE NEW CERTIFICATES!

Andrews core experience students with an interest in Religion may consider one of the new certificates, Christian Discipleship, or Mission & Global Awareness. With a requirement of only 17-18 credits, these certificates only add 5-6 credits (2 classes) to the required Religion credits. By taking a certificate, you may choose your classes with a clear purpose and consequently gain far more from them.

If you do not take a Religion major, do not choose your Religion classes at random or because they are required, but rather choose a class because the topic is of interest to you, and because it may also strengthen your studies in relation to your major.

RELIGION, RELIGION AND SOCIETY BA

This is a unique, interdisciplinary BA where students take Religion along with another major or as part of a preprofessional program. The flexibility of this program allows students to pick significant classes within the field of their second major and integrate the particular relevance for Bible and Religion. The areas for study are (1) Bible, (2) Service, (3) History & Society, (4) Theology, and (5) Research. The summary on this page describes this BA as a two tier program. Upper level classes build on basic information and skills achieved in the five key areas through lower level classes. The summary also reveals that this program contains flexibility and choices which means that not everything is set in concrete. The program can be adapted to the individual student.

Anyone interested should:

- Speak with the Religion Department and get an advisor for the BA in Religion
- · Consult with their advisor in their second major
- The advisors will then work together with the student to compose the most beneficial program for the student, choosing the appropriate classes in view of student interest and skills, and mapping out the ideal sequence of classes.

Note: The BA in Religion with a concentration in Religion & Society is perfectly adaptable to honors students.

LEBANON MISSION TRIP

An understanding of missions is vital for every Theology and Religion major. Each year our department participates in an annual mission trip to the Middle East directed by Dr. Russell. This annual study tour involves students in mission experiences through classes such as Introduction to Missions and through hands-on mission experiences. Known as the Friendship Team, the students conduct campus ministry in Beirut, Lebanon, a crossroads of the east and west and an intersection between the Christian and Muslim worlds. This crosscultural mission experience provides many learning opportunities as well as the development of skills and understandings for both ministry and missions. - Students completing one of the certificates--a mission trip or volunteer service overseas is a requirement for the certificate in Mission and Global Awareness.





PRACTICUM AND RELIGION FORUM



WEEKLY FORUM

All majors in Religion & Theology are required to attend the weekly Religion Forum on Tuesdays from 11:30 -12:20 in the Newbold Auditorium in Buller Hall. The Forum provides worship and fellowship, departmental information, training in various aspects of ministry and lectures on a range of topics of interest for any university student. Though a zero credit class, attendance is required and expected as an integral and significant part of the program for our majors.

PRACTICUM

Theology students will be asked to develop a portfolio of ministry. They will receive specific information about this portfolio in their first semester class, RELP 105 - Introduction Pastoral Service, taught by Dr. Russell.

Religion majors submit one monthly report from their service, which may cover a broader area, as Religion students do not train for professional ministry.

DO YOU LIKE BARNABAS?

The Barnabas project provides students with field experience as well as financial aid. Students work with a local church during the summer, are paid as volunteers, and matching funds are set aside towards their education. Speak with Dr. Russell about this opportunity for ministry and how you can arrange to participate.

PORTFOLIO

For Theology majors, the professional portfolio will present their personal sense of calling to ministry as well as a profile of their ministry skills and experiences. A portfolio is intentional in two ways: in selection of materials for inclusion, and in reflection upon these materials.

Portfolio Phase 1 – Freshmen Year: Your portfolio should include

- A description of your conversion, call and spiritual life.
 - Your Philosophy of Ministry
 - An analysis of your spiritual gifts and ministry
 - A presentation of your vocational/professional plans

Portfolio Phase 2 – End of Junior Year: During your sophomore and junior year, your portfolio should be expanded to include samples of your experiences in the following seven areas: worship, evangelism, nurture, administration, mission, Scripture and relationships.

The portfolio forms the foundation for the senior class, Pastoral Ministry (RELP 485).

GOOD ADVICE FOR...

INCOMING FRESHMEN IN THE THEOLOGY PROGRAM

The suggested class schedule is of great significance and if you do not follow it, you may run into difficulties with your program. Note that the following two one-credit classes are required in the first year **before** your sophomore year can begin:

- RELP 105: Introduction to Pastoral Service
- RELT 295: Introduction to Theological Research

Check your MATH score.

- If necessary, take the math placement test as soon as possible during the first semester.
- If a remedial math class is needed, take it as soon as possible.

Take the God & Human Life test in the first semester if not taking the class.

Most required major classes in the fall take place Monday/Wednesday/Friday so look for your general education classes on Tuesdays/Thursdays.

Transient students (less than 24 transfer credits) **or transfer students** (more than 24 transfer credits) Speak with your advisor regarding:

- the impact of your transferred credits on your program and schedule
- the required RELT100 God & Human Life prerequisite
- the one credit introduction classes
- Investigate whether you have done some community service which makes it possible to waive the BHSC 200 Philosophy of Service class, an Andrews Core Experience requirement.

- how it will impact the remainder of your program



FACULTY RESEARCH AND SERVICE

Your Religion faculty is active in research and service.

Over the last year, individual faculty members have edited books in areas such as the Trinity and hermeneutics, produced book chapters on issues such as servant leadership in the Old Testament prophets, hermeneutics, the Trinity, and the Holy Spirit and church authority in Acts. The department, along with the Sigvartsens, has published survey results from the Beyond Beliefs study, which has also been or will be focused on in The Review, Spectrum, and more. Scholarly presentations cover areas such as animals in the Bible and the issue of non-repentance in Hebrews. The faculty also regularly presents at church programs around the world, including Dubai, Lebanon, Fiji, Germany, Denmark, Dominican Republic, and Venezuela. In the US, locations include OneChurch and OneProject, seminars at Michigan Conference and other camp-meetings, and preaching throughout the States, from New York to Union Theological Seminary. Book assignments for faculty members in forthcoming commentary series include the biblical books of Esther, Habakkuk, Malachi, Acts, and James. The research and service of the faculty deeply and positively impact their teaching and interaction with students at Andrews.

Additional Information Regarding Seminary Prerequisites:


- * Students who have completed an undergraduate course in Pastoral Ministries and Church Policy can opt to take the Seminary's Pastoral Ministries and Church Policy Proficiency Examination. The passing score for this examination is 80%. Students who do not pass this exam must take the class CHMN552: Foundations of Pastoral Ministry and attain a minimum grade of C+.
- ** Hebrew and Greek are required at the Intermediate proficiency level as demonstrated by a qualifying examination rather than a specific number of undergraduate credits.

Deficiencies

Students holding a baccalaureate degree but having deficiencies in their undergraduate prerequisites need to take the equivalent graduate-level course. Students with many deficiencies should plan to begin their studies at the Seminary during the summer session.
