#### **COURSE REQUIREMENTS:**

**Class attendance:** Record will be taken during the first five minutes of class. Promptness is important to the continuity of class discussion, and activities done during class are designed to help students put into practice knowledge gained from textbooks and other sources. Per AU attendance policy, being absent more than 20% of class periods (6) may result in an automatic F. (See AU Bulletin)

**Miscellaneous assignments and quizzes:** Students can expect regular quizzes (primarily on transcription) given on most Wednesdays (see class schedule). Other miscellaneous assignments related to transcribing "client's" speech will also be assigned in class, as well as a "Bible Verse transcription". Semi-regular homework will also be assigned. Worth **40**% of final grade.

**Examinations:** There will be 3 exams given during the semester: 2 during the semester, worth 35% of your final grade, and a comprehensive final exam, worth 25% of your final grade. If you miss a test because of a verifiable illness, you must contact the instructor as soon as you become aware you will miss the test. Schedule a make-up exam directly with me within two school days of the missed test, or you may receive a zero for that exam. Total of all 3 exams worth **60**% of final grade.

**Practice:** To become proficient in the use of the IPA, you will need plenty of practice. A significant portion of class time will be devoted to that practice; however, you may find that you need additional practice beyond that provided in class. Here are some suggestions for practice:

- 1. Your textbook provides practice material, in the form of chapter exercises and "end of chapter" review questions, as well as chapter assignments. As some test questions may come from this material, it would be helpful for you to take a look at it to become more proficient in phonetic transcription.
- 2. Practice CDs are available for use **IN** the department. They may be checked out at the secretary's desk, but must be used in the office.
- 3. Phonetically transcribe the names of your friends, Bible verses, etc. Write a note in IPA to a classmate and ask him/her to write back.
