**PREREQUISITES:** SPPA 234 (Introduction to Speech-Language Pathology and

Audiology)

SPPA 280 (Anatomy and Physiology of Speech and Hearing)

**COURSE DESCRIPTION:** A study of the anatomy and physiology of the vocal mechanism, with emphasis on

normal and abnormal processes of voice and fluency. Assessment and treatment principles of functional, organic and neurological voice pathologies will be addressed, as well as basic principles of stuttering diagnosis and therapy.

Prerequisites: SPPA234, 280, 310. (AU Bulletin, 2013 - 2014)

## **COURSE OBJECTIVES:**

- Discuss the anatomy and physiology central to normal voice production.
- Determine the parameters of normal voice and fluency
- Explain various theories of phonation and fluency.
- Describe the characteristics of various voice and fluency disorders including their clinical manifestations.
- Outline assessment and treatment techniques for voice and fluency disorders.

## **COURSE REQUIREMENTS:**

- 1. Class Attendance: Attendance will be taken during the first five minutes of class. Promptness is vitally important to the continuity of class discussion. If you are unable to attend class, please notify the instructor prior to class to make arrangements to make up work and obtain handout material. Three absences will be allowed. Absences beyond that will jeopardize your grade 2% per day missed after the third day. Prolonged illness with physician explanation will be addressed on an individual basis.
- 2. **5-10 point quizzes** will be given at the beginning of some classes. These quizzes will be given during the first 5 10 minutes of class. Students arriving late will not be permitted to make up these quizzes.
- 3. Two partial exams and one comprehensive final exam. Exams missed due to an excused absence may be made up within three days of the original administration of the exam. Arrangements must be made prior to the day of the exam. Exams missed due to a medical illness will only be made up with a signed medical notice.
- 4. A stuttering simulation experience project will be required of each student. This experiential assignment is important in order that the clinician understand, to the extent possible, the overt and covert dimensions of stuttering. It is also important that the clinician be able to model the desired target responses for the client. Each student will engage in pseudo stuttering in 2 different speaking situations and write-up reactions in a 1-2 page paper. Examples of pseudo-stuttering include silent blocks, voluntary stuttering, cancellations/pull-outs, etc.
- 5. Two case studies will be assigned. This will include one voice case and one fluency case. The cases and questions to answer will be distributed during class. (see class schedule for due dates) Each is worth 20 points.
- 6. **Movie Review.** Each student is required to watch the King's Speech. A short response paper will be completed by each student. Students will watch the movie at the time of their choosing. This movie is available in the James White Library as well as in the department. The movie can be signed out for 3 hours at a time and must be returned to the department. If signed out overnight, it must be signed our no earlier than 4 pm and must be returned by 8 am the following morning.
- 7. **Two Research Article Reviews.** Student will find a research based article, one in the area of voice disorders and the other in the area of disfluency. Each article review will highlight the purpose of the article, research question, method used to conduct the research, final findings and questions or additional research that the article could inspire. Each is worth 25 points. (see class schedule for due dates)
- 8. Each student will prepare a <u>hypothetical clinical case portfolio</u>. Case study may be for an individual with a voice or a fluency disorder. The portfolio is due on **April 24.** Voice disorders may be one of the following or one of the student's choosing:
  - Polypoid Degeneration/Reinke's Edema
  - Paradoxical Vocal Fold Dysfunction (PVFD)
  - Spasmodic Dysphonia
  - Psychogenic/conversion Disorders
  - The Trans-sexual Voice
  - Dysplasia & Laryngeal Cancer

- Sulcus Vocalis
- Essential Voice Tremor
- Voice and Craniofacial Anomalies
- Vocal Disorders in Parkinson's disease

# Stuttering Disorders may be:

- Mild
- Moderate
- Severe

# The <u>hypothetical clinical portfolio</u> is worth 100 points and will include the following:

- a. Referral Letter(s)
- b. Case History Forms
- c. Copies of Test forms (filled out) as appropriate
- d. Complete diagnostic report
- e. Sample Therapy Plan
- f. Any other relevant communication and/or information
