Credit Hour and Commitment

This course is offered for 3 semester credits; therefore it is expected that you will 135 total hours on this course. This course has 16 modules and each module represents a week of a typical semester course. It is recommended that you budget about 8-9 hours for studying and completing the activities for each module.

Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Develop habits and abilities for the study of Biblical languages.
 - a. Recognize and give basic definitions for Greek vocabulary, viewed in any form, down to a NT frequency of 50 uses (Vocabulary included in textbook for class).
 - b. Master the regular NT Greek morphology of the basic elements for each part of speech.
 - c. Understand and recognize the basic Greek syntactical usages for each part of speech. Identify correctly the basic syntactical usages in NT Greek passages.
 - d. Learn how to use lexica, grammars, and other tools (such as Biblical Online Learner; BibleWorks, Logos, and Accordance) to deepen the understanding of the Greek NT.
- 2. Value the knowledge of Greek as a way to build intimacy with the Word of God.

Part 2: Course Methods and Delivery

Methods of Instruction

Methods of instruction include assigned readings from the textbook and the course material, regular ZOOM meetings, assignments, quizzes, and final exam. Regular participation in the course is essential to good performance.

Part 3: Course Requirements

Your Schedule

In Learning Hub, you will access online lessons, course materials, and resources. This course is self-paced. You must complete the course within 180 days. This is the Consortium policy. You may have a stricter deadline imposed by graduation, financial aid, or other restrictions.

Start by creating a schedule for completion of the course.

- Determine your deadline. Do you need a transcript sent to your home institution?
- Working from your deadline, count backwards. Allow 2 weeks after you take your final exam for your final grade to be calculated. Allow another 2 weeks for the transcript to be processed and sent.
- Now use the suggested schedules to create a schedule for yourself that ensures completion 4 weeks before your deadline.

Submit your course plan to your instructor within Learning Hub AND discipline yourself to make regular progress.

Assessment Descriptions

- A. Fourteen Homework Exercises [25%]
 - a. The pdf version of the "workbook" is available online through LearningHub [https://www.learninghub.andrews.edu]. There are Lessons based on content and material from Larry Richard's textbook chapters worth 25% of final grade.
 - b. The students are expected to finish each lesson for their own benefit. However, the course requires a limit of 3hrs a week for this activity. Grades are based both on completeness and accuracy.
- B. Eleven Online Vocabulary Quizzes [25%]
 - a. Online Vocabulary quizzes will be posted on LearningHub. Three attempts are allowed for each quiz; only the highest grade is registered. We encourage students to take the maximum permitted for practice purposes. Remember to adequately fulfill the requirements of honesty and integrity. Students are responsible for due dates. These vocab quizzes are worth 25%.
- C. Attendance of Zoom meetings
 - a. Zoom meetings need to be arranged with instructor for each module. Lecture needs to be watched first. Attendance is worth 10%.
- D. A Devotional to be presented in Zoom meetings [10%]
 - a. Prepare one presentation: a topic will be provided for each presentation. It will be a grammar concept or part of speech that you will have to explain to the class. After the content is explained in 5 min. you have another 5min. for the Devotional. The devotional is a short reflection on how a Greek grammatical concept illuminates the understanding of a biblical text. The presentation/devotional is worth 10%.
- E. Ten Reading Reports [10%]
 - a. The book required is Larry Richards Read Greek New Testament in 30 Days [or Less]
 - b. All 10 Lessons are required (about 114 pages total). It can be read in advance (takes about 6 hours to finish the book). Only a few pages are due with the Lesson, so please read it thoroughly. Reading is worth 10% of final grade.
 - c. The reading report is due on LearningHub in the same date when the Homework Exercise Lesson of the same chapter is due.
- F. Final Exam [10%]
 - a. At the last week of class a final exam will determine 10% of your grade. It covers all concepts learned and all 300 words vocabulary learned in the semester. Remember, you are responsible to make arrangements for an approved proctor and to complete the request form at least two weeks prior to the final exam date. Check the "Exam Proctoring" section below. Exam is due on week 12, the last week of class. Time needed: about 2 hours of preparation and 2 hour to take the Final Exam.

Rubrics

Quantitative Greek Marking Scheme

The marking scheme listed below is qualitative in nature. A quantitative marking scheme may be employed in those instances where a points system is applied to the Greek text. The objective of this grading system is to provide simple and transparent quantitative criteria against which Greek-to-English translations may be graded. The marking ethos is to reward that which the student has achieved rather than to punish failure.

- I. A maximum of one point is awarded for each noun, pronoun, adjective, adverb, conjunction, preposition and question (excluding duplication in the Greek incidental to the translation). Two points are awarded for verbs due to their greater complexity.
- II. Points allocated according to Criterion I are adjusted down according to the severity of the mistake. The marker will seek to ensure that the awarding of points reflects the degree to which the student has correctly translated the word. For example, full points for each word will be awarded if the student demonstrates a correct understanding of the word (i.e. identifies the correct tense, voice, mood, etc.). Likewise, a half-correct translation will receive half points.
- III. The total points available for each Greek sentence will comprise points allocated according to Criterion I and a further two to three points depending upon the length of the sentence. These discretionary points are awarded for the correct translation of the sentence as a whole (i.e., syntax).
- IV. Points may be awarded where students fail to provide a smooth translation of the sentence but include a literal translation directly on the script (i.e., directly above the Greek text). Where an exam includes questions of a more general, they will be marked according to the quantitative marking scheme.

Exams

There is one exam in this course. The final exam covers concepts learned in the course, including vocabulary, grammar and morphology. It is worth 10% of your grade. You will be allowed 120 minutes to take this exam. The exam requires proctoring.

Follow prompts in the course space to set up your exam session. In each module that contains an exam, you will find what to review and what materials are allowed (if any) during the exam.

Please note that an exam code is never released to the student. All students must present photo identification before each exam session. Exams can only be proctored after a deadline with approval directly from the instructor to the Testing Center (sdeexams@andrews.edu or 269-471-6566). No exam is returned to the student for review. The instructor, to aid studying for future exams can provide feedback on exams.
