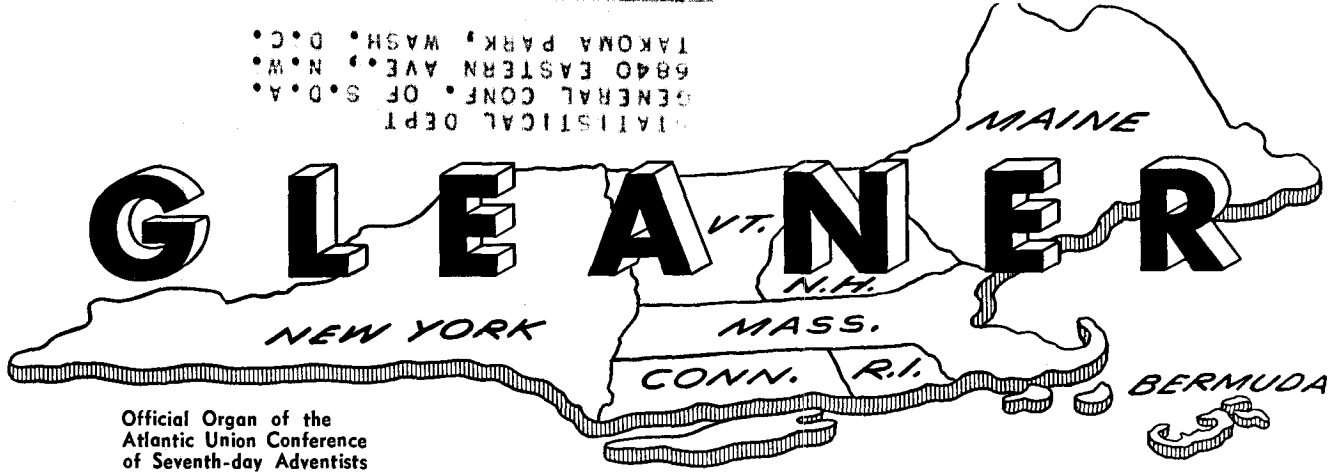




First Anniversary of New York Center

New York Center's first birthday brought many occasions for gratitude for the manifest blessing of God upon twelve months of earnest, prayerful effort.

The weekend services drew an attendance of 1300 people, which represents a steady increase.

The anniversary began with the Friday night service at the Broadway Bible Crusade, where those baptized as the firstfruits of the Center's ministry were presented to the congregation along with the church members who have been assigned as spiritual guardians to encourage and guide and fel-

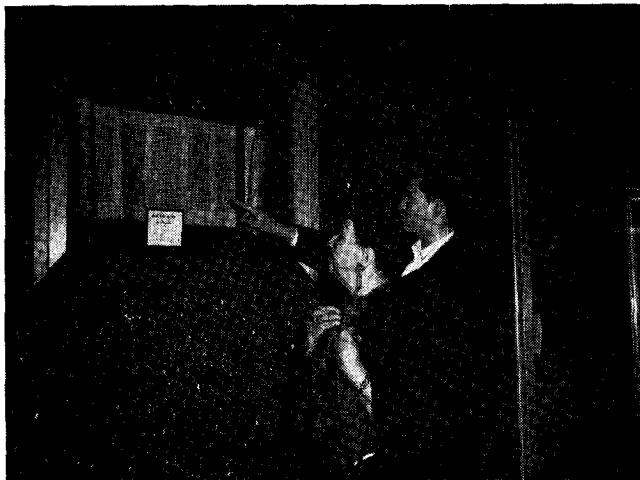
lowship with the new members. The Sunday night evangelistic service, at which Evangelist Elden M. Chalmers conducted a second baptism, closed a week end which marked a high point in the Center's expanding ministry. (Additional baptismal services are scheduled for the vesper service the first Sabbath of each month and the Sunday night evangelistic service at mid-month.)

Sabbath afternoon vespers brought together a group of musicians of outstanding talent—Pastor and Mrs. Dan Cotton, Pastor Liu, and the Faith for Today quartet, vocalists; Mrs. William

A. Fagal, violinist; and Mrs. Catherine Buxbaum, organist. Their ministry of music brought God close to the hearts of the large congregation who listened.

As a part of this service Elder Joseph Barnes, director of the Center, reviewed the highlights of the first busy year, which included playing host to Adventist conventions and groups of all kinds; to the counselors' training class, ushers' meeting, morning devotional services, and other activities of the Graham Crusade; to boards and committees of the Protestant Council, Religion in American Life, and other Protestants groups.

The Center is already proving effective in carrying out the instruction of the Spirit of prophecy concerning the importance of gaining the friendship of religious leaders and other men of influence. Over and over again in this first year, the Center and the pro-

gram being developed here have established immediate rapport with visitors who, until they saw Adventist principles and ideals in this visible form, had little understanding of or sympathy for God's remnant church.

The Center staff which has carried the heavy burdens of this new undertaking for God were introduced at the vespers service, and recognition was given to the loyal volunteers who have held up their hands.

The current lyceum season opened Saturday night with an outstanding film lecture by Frank and Helen Schreider. The young couple presented the story of their 20,000 mile trip from the Arctic to Tierra del Fuego, which has made them famous. Their lecture, which opened the National Geographic lecture season in Washington, D. C., the previous night, had its New York premiere at the New York Center. It was the first of a series of outstanding programs scheduled for the Center's current lyceum season. (Sam Campbell will return December 8.)

These programs with the religious films and Bible classes and the regular Sunday schedule of School of Religion classes, Assembly, and Fellowship supper, added up to a full and inspiration-packed birthday celebration. It marked but the first milestone as the Center staff, the Crusade team, ministers, and laymen dedicated themselves by prayer and work and sacrifice to make the "light at the Crossroads" burn still brighter under the blessing of God.

German New York Church Evangelism

We are in the midst of a well supported house-to-house literature campaign conducted simultaneously with Elder Suckert's public lectures in our new church home. More than thirty church members in pairs are covering whole streets with our literature from week to week in order to find those searching for light, particularly our own countrymen in Yorkville. Approximately two hundred new homes of German speaking people have accepted our German *Signs of the Times* at their open doors.

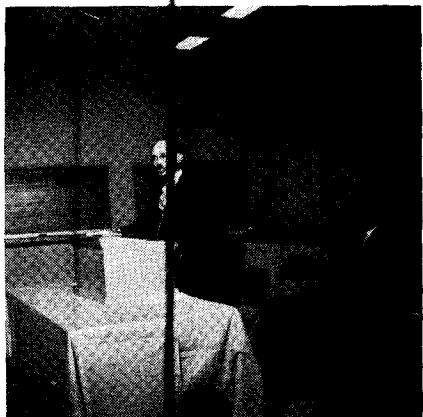

Northeastern Conference Workers' Meeting

The first three-day workers' meeting of the Northeastern Conference was held November 12, 13, and 14 in the Fellowship Hall of the New York Center and the City Tabernacle, with Elder H. D. Singleton presiding. This meet-

ing was considered by a majority to be the most outstanding ever held in the conference, and the topics discussed were of interest and a profit to all who attended.

Present with us were the following General Conference, union conference and Southern Publishing Association speakers: Elders B. E. Wagner, C. E. Moseley, and Miss Helen Smith; Elders L. E. Lenheim, T. R. Gradner, L. E. Esteb, V. W. Becker, and C. H. Smith; and Elder L. B. Reynolds, editor of *Message Magazine*.

Elders C. E. Moseley and L. E. Lenheim began the Tuesday and Wednesday services with devotion, and all were strengthened, encouraged, and inspired. Reports were given by several of the ministers of the conference, and many of these reports included the results of evangelistic meetings which were carried on in addition to the regular church and departmental programs.

Elder C. E. Bradford, home missionary and Sabbath school secretary for the conference, reported that over sixty persons were baptized as the result of the effort held in Manhattan. With the assistance of Elder J. J. North, Elder Bradford has been carrying on



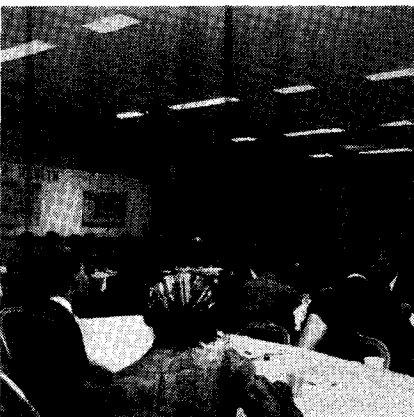

the activities of the Sabbath School and the Home Missionary Departments of our conference.

Elders E. F. Carter, pastor of the Bethel church in Brooklyn; H. R. Murphy, pastor of the Bronx church; and T. D. Wilson, pastor of the Boston church, conducted large tent efforts in addition to their regular church program and as a result well over one hundred were baptized. At present Elders R. T. Hudson and R. T. Wilson are just completing church efforts.

The baptism will total over five hundred for the year, over one hundred more than in any other year. Bible and training lightbearers classes are in process in many of the church in the field; in addition to the efforts held this summer, plans were laid for a greater program in evangelism during 1958.

The fellowship of this meeting and the reports given were a source of encouragement to each worker, and decisions were made to do more for the salvation of souls than ever before. Every department of service was

pledged our unanimous and whole-hearted support.

A special communion service was held for the workers. Elder Moseley delivered the communion message. We fellowshiped together in the ordinance of humility and the breaking of bread. One could feel the very presence of God and could sense the Holy Spirit drawing the workers together in a band of unbreakable fellowship and oneness of spirit and objective. All agreed that it was the most enthusiastic, the most morale building, and greatest of all, the most spiritual workers' meeting they had ever attended. This was evidenced by the response of the workers in the praise service. All left inspired to go all out for the advancement of the work of God.

Baptism at Ephesus

An overflow crowd estimated at 2,000 persons, including scores of visitors, witnessed a special baptism at the Ephesus church in New York City, on Sabbath, November 16, 1957. Twenty-three converts were buried with their Lord, as a climax to 42 consecutive nights of revival services at Ephesus. A total of 55 have been prepared for this rite, Pastor R. T. Hudson announced.

The Ephesus "Bible And Health Crusade," which lasted from October 2 through November 17, featured the preaching of Elder Hudson, and the singing of Miss Joyce Bryant and Miss Shirley Carter, supported by a massed choir of two hundred voices. A large staff of ushers and baby-sitters also assisted. Motion pictures and lectures by outstanding physicians were added attractions.

Among those baptized November 16 were a prominent Long Island attorney, Mr. Reginald Matthews; young Benson and Clanton Craig, sons of the well-known Manhattan dentist, Dr. Santon H. Craig; and Mrs. Minnie Ransom and Miss Nancy Curtis, daughters of the late Elder Charles Curtis. A number of the candidates, Pastor Hudson said, had received their first introduction to the Third Angel's Message through the Voice of Prophecy radio program.

The Ephesus crusade was the last in a record-setting series of evangelistic efforts sponsored by the Northeastern Conference in the New York area during the summer and fall of 1957.

From sailing clippers to steel warships, many of the nation's most important sea craft came down the ways at Bath. Its safe deep harbor gave the city its slogan, "The City Of Ships." This is the 350th anniversary of the launching of the first large ship to be built in the United States. It was near Bath that English settlers built the "Virginia" in 1607, and a recent issue of commemorative stamps honored this event. Merrymeeting Bay here, is one of America's most famous wild fowl assembly places on the eastern migratory route.

Bath's most important harbor, however, is the Seventh-day Adventist elementary school, "The Haskell Memorial." The school also is a memorial to a teacher's love and devotion to Christian education. Mrs. Doris Thistle gave that kind of devoted service in this school from 1945 to 1957. Last year she was assisted by two teacher's aides, Mrs. Lucy Thorne and Miss Drucilla Westermeyer. This completes a series of articles showing the teachers and pupils in our Northern New England schools of 1957. Careful planning, faith, and sacrifice will establish a good school program in your church, also. Are your children in the safe harbor of Christian education?

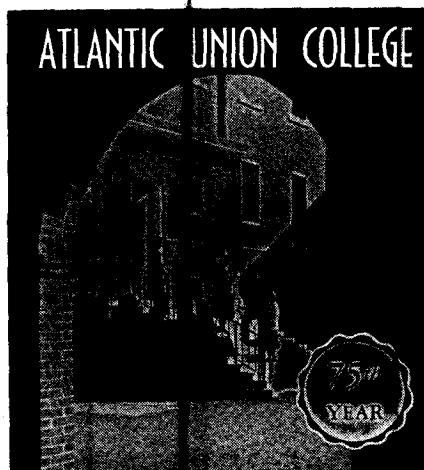

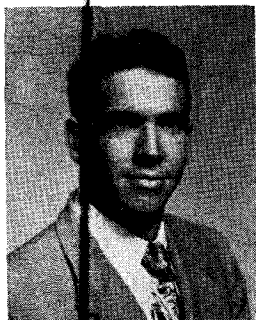

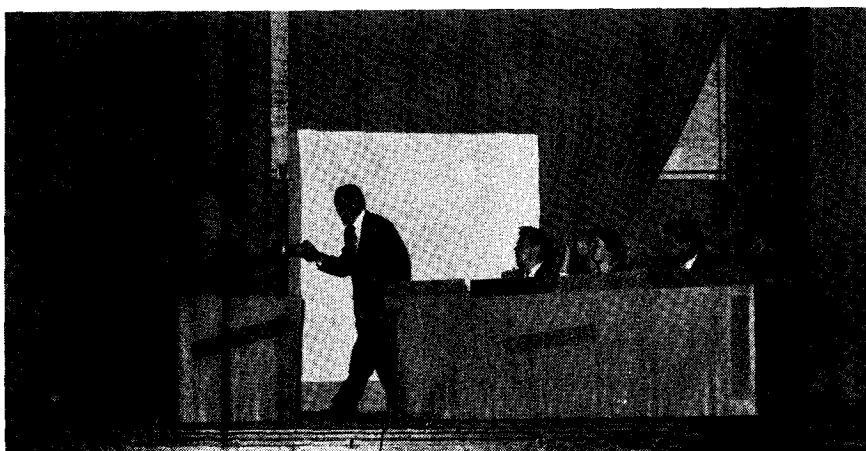
Band Concert
