ARE you aware of the fact that the goals set for our Sabbath schools originate right in the mission field where the need is?

We hear so much about goals that it may be well for us to look behind them and get a new vision of their significance. Someone has truthfully said, "It is possible to be such a slave to goals as to miss the whole objective of the goals."

Perhaps you thought "these goals," which sometimes seem so difficult to reach, were set by a group of individuals with nothing else to do but figure how much you and I should give to missions, which certainly sounds easy enough. But not so. They start with individual workers and families, perchance your own flesh and blood, who have left home and comfort and gone out into a difficult place, there to labor in the cause of God; and end in a compilation at the General Conference treasury. Naturally enough these workers must have funds to carry on and enlarge the work and when these have been budgeted at the lowest possible amount, it is passed on to us as a goal. Picture if you can, this missionary, perhaps your son or daughter, laboring in a tropical country, forced to continue living in a native dwelling and carry on the work without medical equipment or a school, because that goal was not reached. Or, because the Sabbath school of which you are a member, did not do its part. This is no fairy tale, but brief facts. May it never

be that this failure to reach goals will mean the return of that missionary to the homeland!

Sister White has said, "If the plan of systematic benevolence were adopted by every individual, and fully carried out, there would be a constant supply in the treasury. The income would flow in like a steady stream constantly supplied by overflowing springs of benevolence."—Volume III, page 389.

Will you not, dear reader, join me in a consecration of our means to this great cause which we hold so dear and which is so soon to triumph?
