Andrews Gets New President

The North American Council, during its annual board meeting this week, decided on a major shake up of two top officials at Andrews University. After listening to the Standing Committee's on Educational

Standards presentation of the current state of affairs at A.U., the N.A.C. voted to "swap" the food service director and the president of the university. Dr. Richard Lesser will head up the food service program and Art Chafed will move to the position of president of the university beginning on May

Art Chafed is already outlining his new vision for the university. "My first major change will be to implement 'either/or' and 21/10 credit programs," says Chafed.

"The 'either/or' program will be molded after my successful entree program ... either you pay, or you don't go. Students may find this confusing at first, but we feel that it is worth it. The 10/21 credit program will also be molded after my meal plan. We want to be as rigid as possible so that the students will have the incentive to take enough classes to help balance the budget. All in all, I'm really happy with the change. I just hope I'll be featured on an A.U. sweatshirt soon," remarked Chafed.

"The 2 biggest complaints we hear about the university deal with the administration or the food," says Will Neelson. "So, in keeping with the N.A.C 'Creative Problem Solving' policy the natural solution was to make a swap. This way we won't have to fire anyone."

"I was a little apprehensive at first," said Chafed. "But when I was assured that I would be allowed to continue to wear my favorite blue jacket and name tag, I couldn't refuse."

Richard Lesser was also enthusiastic about the swap. "Seems like a great idea to me," says Lesser. "My wife Veta always makes me cook at home. So why not cook for the students?"

There have been some critics of the plan who have experienced doubts as to its feasibility. However, Lesser remained undaunted. "Just

Lesser Speaks Out

"It will help keep the noise down," said president Richard Lesser about the new assigned seating arrangement for the annual board meetings. According to Lesser, in the past, not enough board members were showing up for the annual meetings. "The ones that did show up made too much noise and had trouble paying attention," says Lesser. The assigned seating will help eliminate noise problems by facilitating the taking of attendance and the monitoring of talking out of turn.

Some board members raised questions as to the propriety of having assigned seating to enforce atten-

dance. "It is important that the impetus for participation is self-motivated," remarked one board member, "in order to preserve the quality of participation."

However, Lesser disagreed wholeheartedly with this opinion. "That is a very immature concept," remarked Lesser. "If that board member had been around longer, he would realize that the only way to get people to attend board meetings is to have a mandatory attendance policy."

The penalty for missing over four meetings during a session is a \$25.00 fine. Board members can also be counted absent if the board meeting monitor takes down their name for talking or bringing extraneous materials with them to the meeting.

"When the board

members were appointed, they agreed to follow the rules. We have a special board here and if they don't want to follow the rules, they can go elsewhere to another board," stated Lesser.

New Snack Shop

"It's those green shirts," Bridgett Twirly, snack shop manager, exclaimed. "Well actually, we had money for the shirts, but we just had to order the cute green hats that went along with them. When the bill came back, we were broke."

Consequently, the entire staff will eventually have to be laid off and replaced by coin-operated vending

machines which are being discretely placed around campus.

"I think it's a great idea. I find it much easier to deal with these machines," said one student. "They seem to know exactly what I want and how I want it."

Ben Chilling, food service manager, explained the vending machine program as part of a university-wide program of automation. "We want to take it from the hallway to the classroom," said Chilling. "We hope to one day have vending machines at the bookstore instead of cashiers. We hope to have vending machines at the library instead of librarians. Eventually, the vending machine will replace the teacher in the classroom.

"Our goal is that someday,

students will be able to get an education from their spare change," explained Chilling.

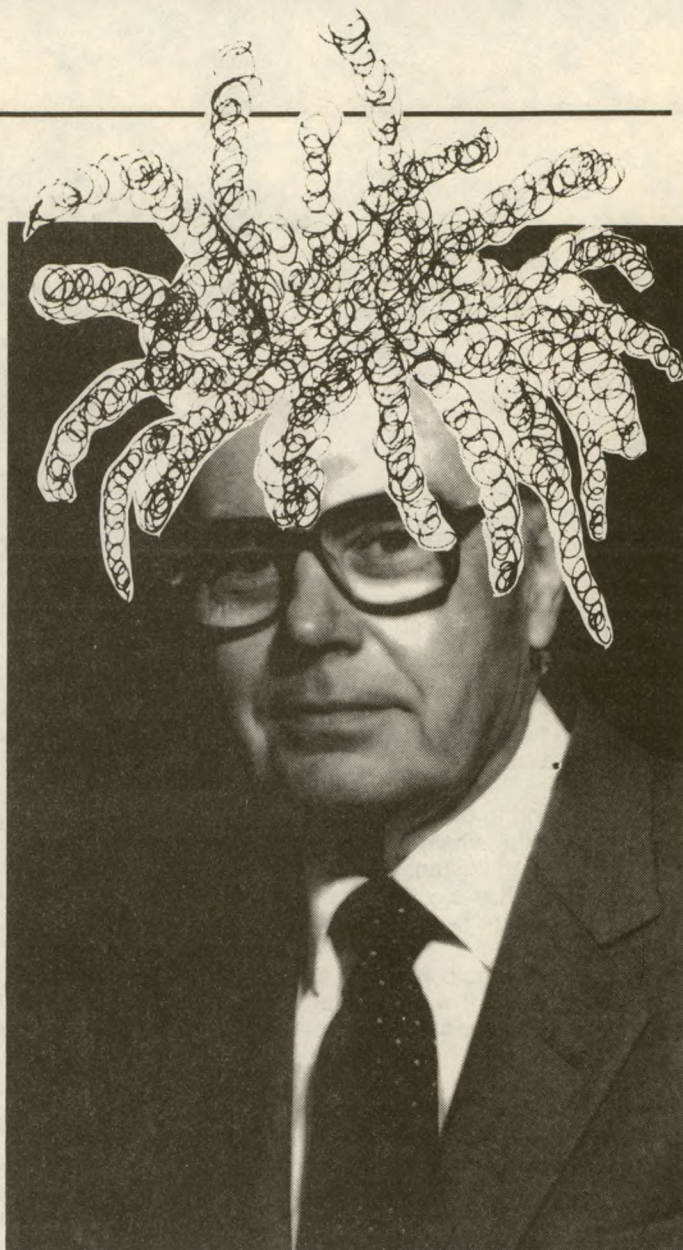


Reemus Poins grabs a bite to eat during practice for his Crawl Across America

"Two million dollars!" read the grant proposal, "If Andrews University professors can develop a hair growth serum within the next two years." That was only two weeks ago and already professors W.W. Progressive Careers for Women in the Church

The issue of women and their increased involvement in the Seventh-day Adventist church has generated such controversy that either the church will be ushered into meaningless theological debate for the next 50 years or suffer the quiet, insidious death of an outmoded cult. With such a promising future in store, many women are excited about the prospects.

"We demand to be included," says Gladys Mumpers, chairperson of Women Inspiring Militant Pastorhood (WIMP). "Let's just say that women have eyes that are set off by clerical collars."

Why such savage contention between the sexes in this modern age? Just where do women stand in relation to the church? And, how will women clergy affect the tithes and offerings income?

Women have had a long and colorful history within the framework of Christianity. The Reverend Felix Misogynist, a noted religious scholar, states, "Ever since Ruth kissed the feet of Boaz, women have had excellent role models to follow." The Rev. Misogynist has

written extensively on the subject of women and has concluded that their current roles are satisfactory and need not be changed. "Allowing women the right to be ordained would just confuse the issue. If women need a greater sense of purpose, believe me, it can be found in Cradle Roll, not the main sanctuary!"

Rev. Misogynist has been accused by various women's organizations of putting women "on the back burner."

"I've actually put them on all four

burners," he says coyly. Despite extensive discussion of this remark, nobody seems to know what he means.

Mumpers recently challenged the Rev. Misogynist to an open forum symposium and panel discussion, but the good reverend thought that if they just sat down and talked, it would be

enough. The two prepared for the debate extensively and, when the fateful day came, arrived at the auditorium in good spirits. Once the gunfire subsided, the debate commenced. 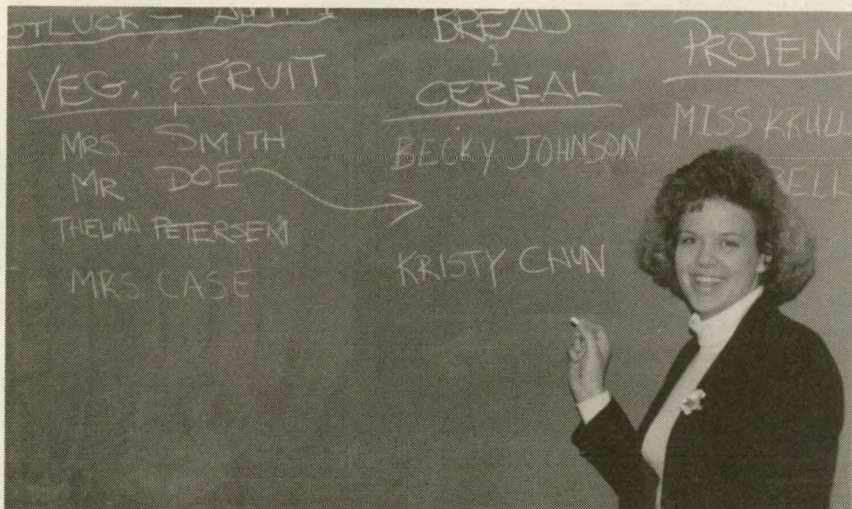

"but that doesn't mean they smoke it! Why do you think they call it 'dope' anyway?" Most recently, the vice-presidents have been working on techniques

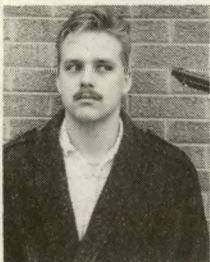


David Fainter, "so why not use it?" It's important that the vice-presidents develop sophisticated dance steps in order to fit in with the young people and effectively survey the crowd for

Faculty Profiles

Crawling Toward Sweet Frontiers

The event is momentous. Dr. Reemus Poins, chairman of the Andrews Institute for Twinkie Advancement and Research, has undertaken a Crawl Across America in order to prove that Twinkies are in actuality an optimum source of protein and energy.

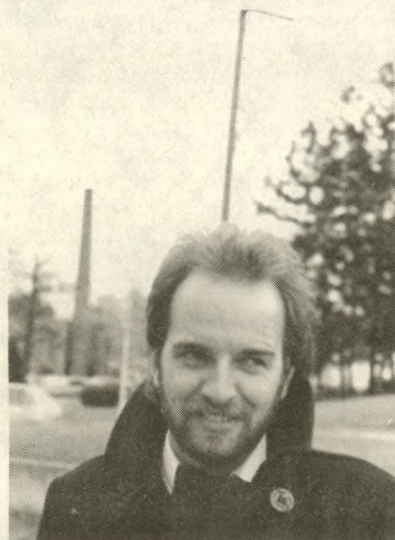
"Oh sure," sputtered Poins, "I suppose I should spend my time studying

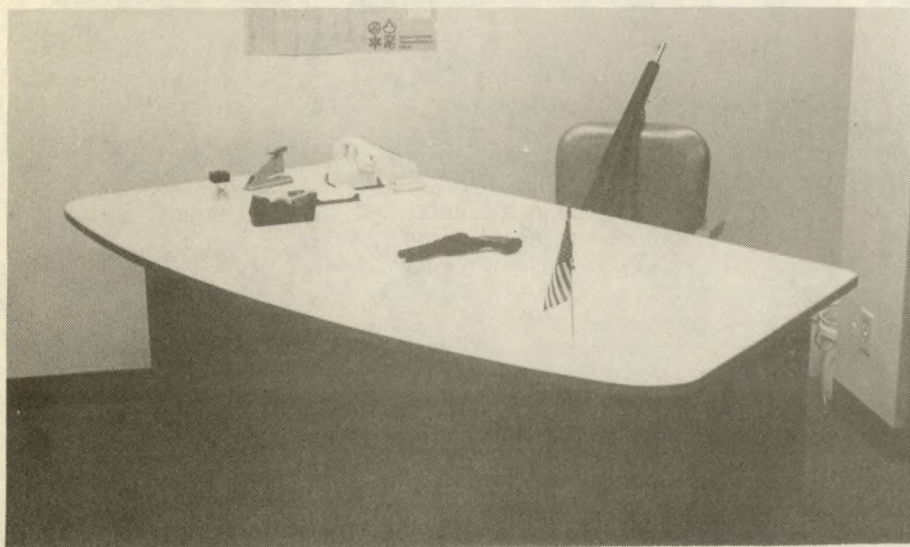


Photography selections from Paula Lindsen's Andrews Campus in Springtime series. Paula is currently a third-year freshman photography major.

After only fifty six years on the political scene, Dale Ngumbo, a 1931 Andrews University graduate, was elected president of the newly established nation of Ngumboland.

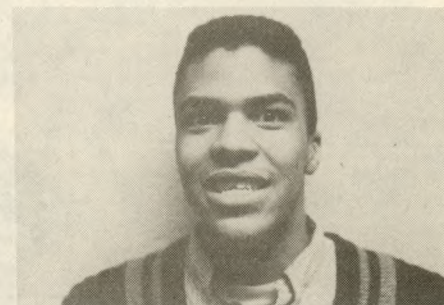
Reporting for the Ngumboland Military Times, a very frightened journalist stated that "Ngumbo has excellent military skills. He is superb at shooting through troublesome situations, bludgeoning opposition into submission, and verbally abusing inexperienced recruits on the parade ground."

While at Andrews, Ngumbo was not allowed to run for Student Association president, so he developed his leadership skills as Pathfinder counselor. His wife, Doloris Godzilla Ngumbo, was graduated from Andrews in 1928 with a B.A. in Nothing in Particular, which is what she did until recently giving it up to assist her husband in kicking a beggar who refused to vote for him during elections held soon after the coup d'etat that brought him to power.

Shortly after Ngumbo was inaugurated as president with full military honors, on Dec. 1, 1986, Dave Faehner, Vice-President for University Advancement, contacted him for a donation. In reply he received a rude letter from the assistant gofer to the deputy secretary of the vice-counsel to the associate director of the under ministry for military assistance to foreign countries. To quote the letter in its entirety, it said "NO."

Enclosed with the letter were a number of photographs. The Andrews University T-shirts being displayed by the Ngumbos were presented to them in the hope that they would bring back pleasant memories and prompt them to make a donation to the endowment fund.

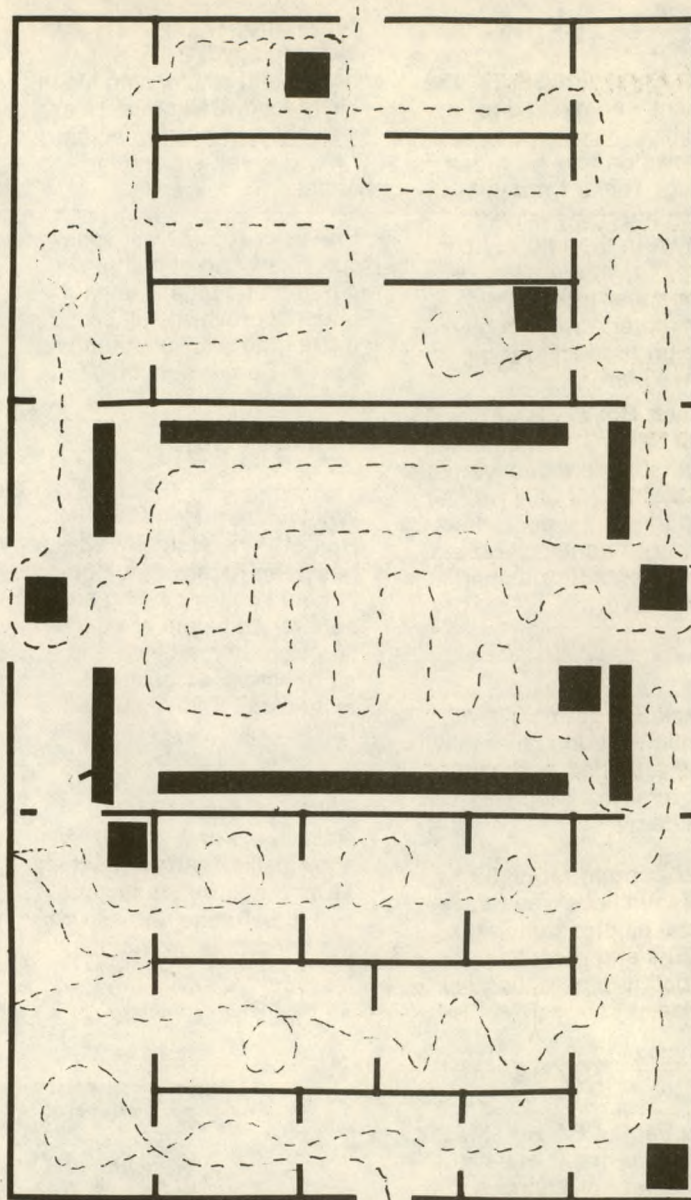
