

Congratulations, Graduates!

You are almost there! Remember, per your Lease Agreement:

- 1. You will need to turn in a 30-day notice.
- 2. You will have 7 days to move out after graduation.
- 3. If you stay longer than 7 days, \$10/day will be charged in addition to your rent.
- 4. Your rent will be prorated according to the number of days you are in the apartment.

Rent will be charged for the number of days you and/or your personal items are in the apartment.

The weather is certainly warming up now. Some of you may be feeling that your apartment is really hot. Here's an option:

Though our office does not offer any for sale or rent, personal air conditioners may be used. An extra charge of \$20 per month for the electricity will be added to apartment rent during the months of June, July, and August if there is a unit in your window. The charges will be incurred whether the air conditioner is used or not. If you will not be using your unit and do not wish to pay the extra charge, please remove the air-conditioner from your window. Units requiring 220 volt circuits may be used in Garland apartments only. Beechwood and Maplewood apartments will handle 115 volt units only.

Please Note: If you have a balance of \$50 or more after the 10th of the month, you will receive a late fee and there will be a hold placed on your account.

If you have mail that is not addressed to you and/or members of your household, please bring that to the office regularly.

We will take care of it. It is a Federal offense to hold onto the mail of someone else.

Please note: If it is addressed to "Resident" or "Occupant," that means you. If you do not want it, please throw it out.

It is summer and people are out running, walking, playing sports and riding bikes/skateboards.
