Research Study Results: Doctor of Ministry Education in NAD

Roger Dudley, Director of the Institute of Church Ministry, a research organization that serves the church in North America, implemented the most comprehensive study ever done on the attitudes and perspectives of pastors and other church leaders on Doctor of Ministry Education in North America. I want to use this space over several months to share some insights he has reported to us.

The first discovery is that 16.9% of the respondents have earned their DMin degree; 10.7% at Andrews. Another 5.1% are enrolled in the Andrews DMin program currently. This would indicate that across our division over 1 in 5 pastors or other church leaders have or are in the process of earning their DMin degree. Another 38.2% of respondents indicated they wish to engage in the DMin program.


The per cent of pastors responding who have earned their DMin degree is 10.7%. Another 4.6% are enrolled in the Andrews DMin program currently. Another 45.8% of pastoral respondents indicated they wish to engage in the DMin program.

Another discovery is that 30% of the ministerial director respondents have earned their DMin degree, and 37% of those serving as presidents of a conference or union.

When Roger shared the report with us he interpreted the results (integrated with other questions in the survey I will share in coming months) to indicate a strong interest in the DMin program as a contributor to meaningful ministry. We pray God will bless those who pursue their development in the program to that end!
