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Where we stand. US Demographic Data

2013 Pew Research Center nationwide survey identifies new "marriage gap" aligned with growing income gap.

- college educated adults with a good income marry at a higher rate
- Lower socio-economic and lower educated individuals are less likely to marry



Marriage Age & Rates

- In 1960, two thirds (68%) of all twentysomethings were married. In 2008, just 26% were married.
- About half **(52%)** of all adults in this country were married in 2008; back in 1960, seven in ten **(72%)** were.
- □ 2017 Average age of couples (M&F) at !st marriage = 27



Is Marriage Becoming Obsolete?

- Nearly four in ten 2013 survey respondents (39%) say that it is obsolete;
- In 1978 when Time magazine posed this question to registered voters, just 28% said marriage was obsolete.



America's Optimism

- Americans are more upbeat about the future of marriage and family
- 67% say they are optimistic than about the future of the country's:
 - educational system (50% optimistic)
 - economic system (46% optimistic)
 - morals and ethics (41% optimistic)



The Definition of Family.

By emphatic margins, the public does not see marriage as the only path to family formation.

86% say a single parent and child constitute a family; nearly as many (80%) say an unmarried couple living together with a child is a family; and 63% say a gay or lesbian couple raising a child is a family. The presence of children clearly matters in these definitions. If a cohabiting couple has no children, a majority of the public says they are not a family. Marriage matters, too. If a childless couple is married, 88% consider them to be a family.



Changing Attitudes:

Emerging definitions of family

- □ People under 30 are generally more tolerant
- secular individuals are more tolerant
- Married individuals are less tolerant
- Blacks are more tolerant
- A third (34%) say the growing variety of family arrangements is a good thing; 29% say it is a bad thing and 32% say it makes little or no difference.



Readiness for Marriage.

Some 67% of survey respondents say that in order to be ready for marriage, it's very important for a man to be able to support his family financially; just 33% say the same about a woman.



The Rise of Cohabitation.

As marriage has declined, cohabitation (or living together as unmarried partners) has become more widespread, nearly doubling since 1990, according to the Census Bureau. In the Pew Research survey, 44% of all adults (and more than half of all adults ages 30 to 49) say they have cohabited at some point in their lives. Among those who have done so, about two thirds (64%) say they thought of this living arrangement as a step toward marriage.



In Marriage, Love Outweighs Money.

Far more <u>married adults</u> say that <u>love (93%)</u>, making a <u>lifelong commitment (87%)</u> and <u>companionship (81%)</u> are very important reasons to get married.

Whereas, 59% say the same about having children and

31% say financial stability are important reasons to get married.

Unmarried adults order these items the same way.

However, fewer than one third (28%) of survey respondents agree that there is "only one true love".
