Important Note: This course is a remote course. You will need to have wi-fi (access to internet), a computer or tablet with a camera or webcam. Use of a phone for class sessions will not work well due to screen sharing and other modalities. During the class sessions you will need to have the audio and video turned on for class discussions and presentations. You will be required to be present online (through Zoom) for each class session on Mondays from 6:30 – 8:00 pm.

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

RELG160 LOVE 101 challenges students to carefully explore and reflect upon their understanding of human relationships in the context of God's relationships with humankind. The course explores biblical foundations and practical applications for our most important human relationships: friendship, dating and courtship, engagement, marriage and parenting. Topics to explore include love and infatuation, compatibility, conflict resolution, religious and cultural principles, marital relationship and adjustment, and family structure and dynamics. Students in the course will be challenged to seek positive, wholistic inter-personal relationships that are essential for an abundant life.

Credit Hour Justification. (Estimation of Time Use for Completing Assignments)

An undergraduate 3-credit course requires a total of 135 hours for the entire course including course lectures, reading requirements, quizzes and tests, research and written assignments. Here is the general over-view of the estimated time allocations for this class.

Summary: 60 hours in lectures, 50 hours on reading and study for quizzes and tests, and 25 hours spent in researching and assignments.

HOW TO BE SUCCESSFUL IN THIS CLASS! (Class Requirements)

Class attendance

"Whenever the number of absences exceeds 20% of the total course appointments, the teacher may give a failing grade. Merely being absent from campus does not exempt the student from this policy. Absences recorded because of late registration, suspension, and early/late vacation leaves are not excused. The class work missed may be made up only if the teacher allows. Three tardies are equal to one absence.

Attendance is required because much of the learning process takes place in the classroom. Due to the nature of this class no more than two absences will be allowed. More than 2 absences or excessive tardies will definitely require you to drop the class. Choose your regular seat by the end of the second class period so that record can be taken quickly. Active and positive class participation will enhance your academic success. If you need to be absent be sure to make arrangements with the teacher ahead of time unless it is an emergency.

Lectures, Discussions, Assignments

You will need to take careful notes of the material covered in class. Class lectures and discussions will generally follow the course content outline and there will be additional online materials and assignments. Be an active learner: engage in discussions, take responsibility for assignments, keep up to date...

Readings:

Specific reading assignments will be given over material in your textbooks as well as other materials and handouts. The assigned reading will deepen and broaden the student's understanding of the course content. Some of the questions on quizzes and tests will be taken from assigned textbook material.

Ouizzes:

There will be weekly class quizzes throughout the semester and the lowest quiz will be dropped. <u>There are no late or make-up quizzes</u>. These quizzes will provide a way to evaluate the student's reading of specific assigned materials as well as the student's understanding of materials presented in class.

Family Interview Project:

The project involves creating a video story of your family. You may select one individual or several in your family and interview them about relationships and love. The project requirements are as follows:

- * A one-paragraph summary description of your family project plan.
- * A clear <u>plan</u> of <u>what</u> and <u>how</u> you plan to accomplish.
- * You can use your phone to record the video or zoom, etc but keep the technology simple.
- * A list of the interview questions.
- * The completed video should be 7-10 minutes in length. Be sure the video has good lighting and audio.
- * Use the report link in the Learning Hub to submit your final project report by Monday, October 5.

Late penalty:

All assignments are due at the beginning of class. Any assignments turned in after the beginning of class are late. There are no makeup quizzes but the lowest quiz score will be dropped. Late exams are only possible in the case of a rare emergency or medical condition and permission to take the exam must be arranged before the exam time. Late papers and late exams will receive a 20% late penalty. Getting you work completed before it is due is an effective protection against last minute problems.... such as computer hassles, dating traumas, etc). Exceptions must be cleared in advance.

Course Procedures Summary:

- 2. It is important for students to participate in classroom discussion and activities.

- 4. There are no late quizzes or exams unless there is a serious emergency.
- 5. No provision is made for exams/quizzes missed due to voluntary absences.

On-Line Course Components:

Zoom: We will use Zoom for the Monday night class sessions this semester. Because those sessions will be interactive you will need to have access to the internet (wifi), have a laptop computer or tablet and a web (often built into laptops, etc). Using your phone is not acceptable for the Zoom sessions since it limits readability of documents, screen sharing, etc.

Learning Hub: This course includes on-line curriculum components. Each student will need to regularly access the course through the Learning Hub web portal for Andrews University. After logging in using your AU username and password (just like email), you will be able to access the appropriate items for the class.

Academic dishonesty (cheating) is most harmful to one's own self and will be dealt with according to the university bulletin. At minimum this means receiving zero credit on the assignment or test. The issue of plagiarism, taking someone else's ideas or words and presenting them as your own, is a very serious one for students on a Christian campus. Students must avoid plagiarism in written and oral work. They should:

- * consider a variety of sources critically, not just one source
- * use their own words and sentence structures as they discover their own style.
- * always give proper credit by referring to sources adequately
- * always use footnotes/endnotes when referring to someone else's facts or ideas


Academic dishonesty includes but is not limited to the following:

- Falsifying or presenting falsified documents.
- Plagiarizing (copying what someone else has written and presenting it as your own)
- Misusing copyrighted material and/or violating licensing agreements.
- Using media from any source or device, including the internet, in ways that mislead, deceive or defraud.
- Presenting another person's work as one's own.
- Using materials other than those specifically allowed by the teacher or program during a quiz or examination.
- Stealing, accepting or studying from stolen quizzes or examination materials.
- Obtaining information from another student or any other source before or during a test or quiz.
- Assisting others in acts of academic dishonesty, such as falsifying attendance records or providing unauthorized course materials.
- Acting deceitfully in any other academic matter.

Glenn Russell was born in Egypt to missionary parents and his formative years were spent living in Beirut, Lebanon. He graduated from Columbia Union College, later graduated with a Masters of Divinity degree from the Andrews University Theological Seminary. He earned a Doctor of Ministry degree from Trinity International University with an emphasis on missions and ministry. Dr. Russell is chair of the Department of Religion and Biblical Languages at Andrews University.

In his limited spare time he enjoys playing the guitar, playing soccer, and learning about being a global Christian in the more than 28 countries where he has served. Most importantly Glenn Russell is a sinner saved by the marvelous grace of Jesus Christ.
