Topic Summary: a survey of preliminary reading done on a topic of investigation
COMPONENTS [] Ten-page limit, double-spaced at 11 or 12 pitch Times Roman, plus attachments.
[] Title of 15 words or less
[] Introductory paragraph indicates to the reader how your Topic Summary is organized
[] a. A brief description of the topic and why you selected it (2-3 paragraphs)
[] b. How knowledge bases underlying the topic are structured and organized (may include concept map)
[] c. Origins (history) and development of the topic (2 pages or less)
[] d. Key concepts, theories, ideas, definitions (2 pages or less)
[] e. Various ontological, epistemological, and axiological issues pertaining to this topic; other debates and differing points of view (2 pages or less)
[] f. Main questions that have been addressed to date in the literature (1 page or less)
[] g. Questions of interest to you that have not been addressed. Evidence of a need for further investigation of your topic of interest (justification) (1 page or less)
[] h. how your literature review might be organized; concluding remarks (1 page or less)
ALSO CONSIDER
[]Internal consistency; a connecting theme throughout; tight; avoid excess verbiage. Use metaphor and abstraction where possible.
[]A nice array of supporting references (in bibliographic form)
[]Factual; free from errors; complete enough in scope
[]Reader-friendly and clearly written; neat; accurate grammar and punctuation. Avoids long, rambling sentences.
