A discussion about the progress of the affiliation between Home Study International and Andrews University was lead by Pat Mutch and Dave Penner.

PROGRESS REPORT ON AFFILIATIONS WITH HSI

Stages of acceptance of college courses offered through HSI:

Level 1 are existing courses to be reviewed for suitability.

Level 2 are courses used as is with a priority for revamping in the near future (following our time-line).

Level 3 our courses to be developed.

Suggested equivalents for General Education requirements were presented (see handout). North Central will allow up to 50% of our courses to be distance learning courses.

Approval was requested for the following degrees to be offered through HSI (ie. approval of different delivery system - these degrees are currently offered by Andrews University:

BA Religion (equivalent program to what is offered at AU- Griggs currently offers this)

AA in General Studies: Personal Ministries track

BA in General Studies: Humanities track


Others degrees are being considered but which will need more work to develop and go through the normal channels of curriculum review and approval.

The council voted to recognize the granting of degrees through distance delivery systems if they meet the following criteria:

- 1. These categories of degrees are already offered at Andrews University.
- 2. The requirements are equivalent.
- 3. Degree development is accomplished through the usual committee processes.

The council recognizes that no more than fifty percent of the degree shall be taken

Dear Harold,

The following action facilitating the processing of graduation applications was taken by Graduate Council on October 16, 1996. The action also has the support of deans who have to sign the petitions under the current policy. To keep the process consistent within the University, we would need to vote a similar motion in Undergraduate Council. We have students already applying for graduation, so we probably should review this at the earliest opportunity.

Graduation in absentia

It was voted to approve the following regarding graduation in absentia:

Graduation services are provided on-campus twice a year--in June and in August. Students must indicate at the time of application for graduation whether or not they plan to participate in the ceremony. Any fees associated with graduation will be applied equally to those graduating in absentia as they are for those marching.

This replaces the current bulletin reading:

Graduating in Absentia. Students wishing to graduate in absentia must submit the Petition for Absentia Graduation to their respective academic dean. All financial obligations to the college must be met prior to the expected date of graduation.

A.A. DEGREE: Associate Arts A.S. DEGREE: Associate Science

A. Degree Requirements:

This degree is available through an application process only. Application must be made prior to the last 30 credits of an associate degree. Within the process an overall program plan is defined and determination is made as to the appropriateness of the degree with consideration of the career and personal goals of the applicant.

- 1. A minimum of 96 quarter credits including an area of emphsis drawn up in consultation with the Continuing Education office and appropriate departments.
- A minimum cumulative G.P.A. of C (2.00) in both Andrews University credits and in transfer credits.
- 3. A minimum of 30 quarter credits in residence of which 16 must be taken on campus.
- 4. A formal request for graduation, approved by the student's Program Committee and a delegated Records Officer.
- 5. Students may earn only ONE General Studies associate degree.
