Awarding Degrees to Former Students

- Discussed the possibility of awarding degrees to former students who have not completed a degree at Andrews University but have gone on to attend and complete a degree from a medical or a dental school.
- AU used to have a policy in 1980 which permitted the awarding of such degrees BS in Human Sciences. In 1990 this degree was deleted from the bulletin (no one had applied for the degree).
- MOTION: Explore, in an expedited way, awarding degrees to former students. Details will be worked out in the Arts & Sciences Courses and Curriculum Committee and be brought back to the Program Development and Review Committee and the Undergraduate Council in its February 2010 meeting.

One Degree with Multiple Majors: Students may earn more than one major for a single degree. When more than one major is chosen, all the requirements for each major must be met to include all cognates for each major. If the majors represent more than one degree the student must specify which degree he/she wishes to receive (i.e. BA or BS or Bprofessional) and complete the General Education requirements for that degree. A course may be used to fulfill the requirements for more than one major or minor if at least 75% of the required major/minor credits are not also counted for another major/minor. A course may not be used to fulfill the requirements of more than one major or minor used for teacher certification. Any courses that fulfill cognate requirements for one major/minor may also be counted for another major/minor. One diploma will be issued for the single degree even if there are multiple majors.

Multiple degrees: Students who earn more than one major and the majors are in different degrees may wish to earn a degree for each major (i.e. BA or BS or Bprofessional). If more than one degree is chosen the general education requirements for each degree must be completed. A General Education course may be used to fulfill the General Education requirements for multiple degrees. All the requirements for each major must be met to include all cognates for each major. A course may be used to fulfill the requirements for more than one major or minor if at least 75% of the required major/minor credits are not also counted for another major/minor. A course may not be used to fulfill the requirements of more than one major or minor used for teacher certification. Any courses that fulfill cognate requirements for one major/minor may also be counted for another major/minor. One diploma will be issued for each degree earned.

# (Major Name) General Education Requirements 2010-2011

Religion: 4 courses

Composition: 2 courses

Communication: 1 course

History: 1 course

Fine Arts/Humanities: 1 course

#### Life/Physical Sciences

Life Science—A full sequence of anatomy and physiology or general biology with labs plus an upper division science course(s) related to human physiology or human biology.

#### Physical Science:

Option 1: A full sequence of general physics with labs as required for physics majors or premed students plus any two chemistry courses with labs; or

Option 2: A full sequence of general chemistry with labs as required for chemistry majors or pre-med students plus any two physics courses with labs.

Mathematics: A basic statistics or research methods course

**Computer Literacy:** A PT department approved computer course which includes word processing, or pass a college-level competency exam of equivalent skills.

**Service:** Not required as it is taught in the professional program.

#### **Social Sciences:**

Psychology—An introductory psychology course.

Human Development—A course which covers physical, social, and psychological development beginning with conception.

**Fitness Education:** Two courses. Recommend Andrews Freshmen take HLED126 Fit for Life and one additional course from personal fitness, outdoor skills or team activity. Non Andrews Freshmen take two from the three categories above.

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### 5-2:0 B. DEGREE STRUCTURE<sup>17</sup>

### 5-2:1 1. Definition of Degrees

Andrews University offers three types of baccalaureate degrees (Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science and professional degrees), and associate degrees.

- a. A Bachelor of Arts (BA) degree is conferred upon a student who completes requirements at the baccalaureate level in the arts, humanities and related areas.
- **b.** A Bachelor of Science (BS) degree is conferred upon a student who completes requirements at the baccalaureate level in the sciences, applied sciences and related areas.
- c. Professional degrees (Bachelor of Science in \_\_\_\_\_\_, or Bachelor of \_\_\_\_\_\_,) are conferred upon students who complete requirements at the baccalaureate level in professional programs.
- d. Associate degrees are awarded to students who complete two-year general studies or paraprofessional program.

## 5-2:2.4 d. Professional Degree Components

i. General Education

As approved by the General Education Committee and the relevant professional degree council or school courses and curricula committee/faculty. If a program is specifically accredited or certified, the requirements of the accreditation/certification body must be considered in establishing general education requirements for that program.

- ii. One of the following
  - i. Professional program requirements, or
  - ii. A professional degree core with majors.

Majors for professional degree programs shall consist of a minimum of 27 credits.

- iii. Cognates may be required
- iv. General Electives
